NAMED TO TOP 100

Dr. Suzanne Knoebel, Herman C. and Ellnora D. Krannert Professor of Medicine, associate director of the Krannert Institute of Cardiology, assistant dean for research at the I.U. School of Medicine, outstanding cardiologist, clinician and teacher, highly respected investigator in heart disease, who served as the first woman president of the American College of Cardiology last year, has added a new honor to the list. She is one of America's 100 Most Important Woman—named by Ladies' Home Journal in its October issue.

The <u>Journal's</u> 10-month project to identify the most influential women in America began by consulting professional organizations and academic experts, checking lists of recent award winners and poring over scholarly journals as well as newspapers published throughout the country. The final 100 were pulled from a master list of 250 women who have had great influence on the nation and its citizens. The final roster all are achievers, and their outstanding successes help to define the new and expanding role of women today.

FAREWELL KEN BECKLEY

Ken Beckley, director of University Relations for IUPUI since Jan. 1, 1977, has been named Vice President of Public Relations and Advertising for H.H. Gregg, Inc., Indiana's largest appliance dealer. He will assume his new duties on Oct. 10.

Beckley, who has been responsible for the work of the News Bureau, the Office of Publications and Information Services, the I.U. MEDICAL LIBRARIANS RETIRE; DIRECTOR APPOINTED

Mary Jane Laatz, director of the School of Medicine Library, Nina S. Campbell, associate director of the Library, and Elaine H. Whitinger, nursing and allied health librarian all retired on Sept. 15. Miss Laatz, who served as director from 1957 until her retirement, first came to the Library in 1941. Mrs. Campbell, who had held the title of associate director since 1978, came to the Library in 1951 and supervised the reference department for many years. Mrs. Whitinger came to the Library in 1958 and in 1982 was awarded the Honorary Alumni Award for outstanding service to the School of Nursing and to the University. Total years given to the Library by these three librarians consitutes almost a century of service. In recognition of the contribution made to the School of Medicine, all three have been granted Emeritus faculty status.

Dana M. McDonald, currently Chair, Department of Information and Communication Sciences and director and professor, Medical library at Southern Illinois University at Springfield, has been appointed as the new director of the School of Medicine Library. Mrs. McDonald will assume her responsibilities on Nov. 1. In the interim, Ann Van Camp, director of online searching at the Library, is serving as acting director.

DENTAL RESEARCH PATIENTS NEEDED
