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MESSAGE OF THE PRESIDENT

Two years ago the Convention at St. Louis honored the Pittsburgh District by entrusting to it the formation of the Bundesvorort or National Executive Committee. It will be the duty of this Convention at Elkhart Lake to pass upon our labors and to decide whether we have proved worthy of that trust.

Our task has been rendered pleasant by the loyal cooperation of Turners everywhere, and also by visible signs of progress in the organization that for seventy-five years has steered steadfastly toward its goal—"a sound mind in a sound body." This progress is evident not merely in a renewed growth of membership, there having been an increase of 1174 during these two years, but especially in the knitting together of our forces, the infusion of new hope, and the determination to press onward to fresh victories. The blight of war, the paralysis of prohibition, the friction engendered by transition from a membership predominantly German to a new generation only relatively German, have caused some societies to lapse and some members to lose heart. The time of these tribulations and shrinkages is past; a new era of progress and promise has dawned. The American Turnerbund is a living force and a growing influence.

Last year our gain in membership was 433, and would have been much greater but for the fact that many societies have cleared away dead timber, and a few districts also have dropped societies that were inactive or comatose. During the coming year we confidently look forward to a greater increase and the organization of many new societies, plans for which are already under way. The total membership on April 1, 1925, was 31,932.

We can also report an increase in the value of the property owned by our societies, which now amounts to \$7,604,990, being \$475,036 more than last year. New Turner Halls are being built in various cities—from Pittsburgh to Los Angeles. Turner parks and summer camps are being acquired everywhere. We are beginning to learn that the Turnverein is an extension of the home and an annex to the school; that money invested in the Turner Hall is an asset, not an extravagance.

Then there is the Jahn Educational Fund, which has grown steadily until it has risen to over \$16,000. To be exact, the subscriptions at the time of going to press amounted to \$16,031.60, while the cash in bank bearing interest was \$9,070.60. The first sum expended out of the Fund was used to buy books for the Girls' Dormitory of the Normal College at Indianapolis—books that will lead those young girls to think and to understand the Turner philosophy of life. The next appropriation is for a literary prize: the sum of \$50 and a medal to be given annually for three years for the best poem in German either written by a Turner and published anywhere, or written by one who is not a member and first published in the Turnzeitung. The judges are Prof. J. F. L. Raschen, of the Executive Committee, Prof. Camillo von Klenze, and Miss Margarete Muensterberg. We hope to do many things with the Jahn Fund as it grows, to make the Turner cause more widely known and attract to it the best minds in America. Further details about the Fund are on other pages—but I am glad to report that the Fund is a reality, that it is

growing, that it has stirred many Turners to generous response and new aspiration in the spirit of Friedrich Ludwig Jahn.

Best of all, we can report an increase in the mental activities fostered by the societies. Our organization will be a great power only if it produces men and women who will think—men and women who will not be afraid to tread new paths, seek new truths, set up new landmarks. Standing upon the firm rock of liberty, let us lift our eyes to the eternal stars of justice. With an intellectual ferment stirring throughout the Turnerbund—in the little town of Sheboygan, for example, over 400 attended one meeting for mental culture—we may be sure that our other goal also is not being lost to sight—"Liberty, Enlightenment, and Prosperity for all."

Still there is much to be done. What we are doing justifies encouragement; what we are leaving undone does not permit us to loll at ease or preen ourselves in pride. Some of us may be tired, and some of us may be lazy; whatever the cause, the consequence is deplorable. When a letter of inquiry is sent out, with an envelope for reply enclosed, and one-half of our societies return no answer to very simple questions, it is a sign of apathy and laxness. As a militant organization, we should cultivate stricter discipline. This means every individual member, no matter how humble his place or function in the society. We should follow our leaders, march in line, do our share. This alone spells success!

It is true, however, that in the past there has been too little touch between the Bundesvorort and the Districts and Societies. Many Societies, unfortunately, have hardly known that they were integral parts of a great national organization. This state of affairs we will seek to remedy. If in the future any Society does not know there is a Bundesvorort, it shall not be our fault.

Societies and Districts are going to hear more from us during the coming year, unless you regard this as a threat and save your skins by selecting another Vorort. The great work of the Turners must not be permitted to languish or decay. We have a service we must render to democracy and humanity. Our societies everywhere should aim to build up the bodies of men, to enlighten their minds, and to stand as beacons to their civic conscience. We shall not only remind you of this your duty—we shall endeavor to the best of our ability to advise and aid you in its performance. If we know where we are going, and march forward, we'll get there. Let us make this a year of progress and victory.

During the coming year two matters will engage our attention. One is the National Tournament that will probably be held in the city of Louisville, Kentucky. I have good news for all Turners who expect to attend that tournament. We shall have as our honored guests, to demonstrate their prowess as disciples of Turnvater Jahn, a group of the best Turners from Germany. They will be accompanied by Dr. Oscar Berger, President of the Deutsche Turnerschaft, and other representatives of that great organization with over two million members. As an assurance of the solidarity of spirit animating the Turners of two continents, as a revelation of the fine achievements of our Teuton rivals, and as a renewal of those amicable ties which have bound us to the German people, this pilgrimage of German Turners to our Turnfest will be an occasion for rejoicing and congratulation. Let us prepare a rousing reception for our German brethren, and let us also gird our loins for the fray, that they may not carry off all the laurels at Louisville.

The other matter that should engage much of our attention will be the battle against certain manifestations of medievalism which are cropping out in

our land. Prohibition is the most rampant of these menaces. Blue laws, censorships, interference with academic freedom, and a wide-spread disposition to nullify the first amendment to the Constitution, are causing deep concern to all friends of our established institutions and reverenced ideals. Are we to be tied to the apron-strings of a maternalistic government? Can a democracy endure in which one-half the people are criminals and the other half spies? The great Goethe said: "Let every one sweep before his own door, and the police keep from meddling with joy." (Jeder kehre vor seiner eigenen Tuer und die Polizei stoere die Freude nicht.) But our new-baked Puritans think that pleasure is sin, that God is an undertaker, that truth is dynamite, that Sunday was made for sorrow, and that liberty is the highway to Hell. Mr. Volstead declares we must drink only what he drinks, and Mr. Bryan declares we must think only what he thinks. We intend to stand firmly against all encroachments of malignant fanaticism.

According to these bigots, God created man in His own image, but made him an eternal infant, and has to employ Volstead and Bryan as nursemaids to take care of us. That is why they hate Darwin, because he taught that man had risen from lower to higher planes. They're afraid men will grow up. But as a result of their persecution, thousands are today studying Evolution, and Darwin will be revered as a Columbus who discovered a new world of thought, when Bryan, the Brontosaurus of the Everglades, will be raging up and down the Celestial Chautauqua Circuit, demanding the deportation of Zeppelin, because the angels might fly too far.

We, as Turners, have no fear of the heights. Our ambition is to be abreast of the age, in the van of Freedom's far-flung host.

In line with this determination is the revision of our Fundamental Principles submitted by the National Executive Committee in accordance with the mandate of the last Convention. At that Convention a new draft was presented by the Illinois District, with many excellent suggestions. The present declaration of principles has been collated with that new draft, rearranged to reveal the whole as a logical deduction from the fundamental human right of liberty, augmented by the inclusion of some other necessary corollaries, rewritten to make it all so clear as to be self-evident—and the result is now presented for your approval, then to be submitted to the societies for final adoption. With this new Declaration of Principles, submitted with this Annual Report, our American Turnerbund would stand in the forefront of all the organizations that are striving for a better world and a nobler race, for fundamental democracy and equal justice. It is a document we have striven to make as progressive as a plow and as conservative as a farm.

I have little more to say. Certain specific recommendations concerning various of our activities and interests are embodied in separate resolutions, to be presented to this Convention in due order. Wisdom and courage will be required in your discussions and decisions. My widening acquaintance and deepening intimacy with the societies and membership of the Turnerbund lead me to believe that your wisdom and courage will be found equal to every task before you. Let us begin our labors with our old battle-cry—"Gut Heil!"

FUNDAMENTAL PRINCIPLES OF THE AMERICAN TURNERBUND

(Revised for Submission to the Convention at Elkhart Lake, Wis.)

The American Turnerbund is a federation of Turner Societies in the United States of America, organized to promote physical education and disseminate rational ideas, in order to advance the health, happiness, prosperity, and progress of mankind.

It is the principal duty of our Societies to provide courses in physical training for youth and adults, and also to promote their intellectual growth and moral character through special schools, instructive lectures, and stimulative debates.

Believing in the United States as a democracy in a republic, established upon the principles of freedom and equality, dedicated to justice and humanity, we recognize in the harmonious education of body and mind the most important factor to preserve and perfect such a democracy. Therefore we seek to train the citizen for the efficient discharge of all his duties toward the community, showing him how to live his own life in a wholesome and rational way, with happiness as its proper goal and utility as a safe moral guide.

Man's highest function is to think, and his noblest service to proclaim the truth as he sees the truth. Conduct should be based on Reason and Knowledge, and these can be attained only through Liberty, the first of all human rights, not to be denied by bigots nor abridged by censors. We hold, therefore, that the state has the paramount duty of protecting the individual in the exercise of those fundamental rights guaranteed by every liberal constitution—the right of free speech, free press, and free assembly. Conversely, we hold that the state has no right, either by constitutions or laws, by multiplied prohibitions and magnified police powers, to impair any human right that does not diminish or destroy any rights of other human beings.

In matters of religion and conscience, especially, striving for the dissemination of a philosophy based on the ever-growing knowledge of natural forces, we demand freedom and tolerance in the broadest sense. Believing in the well-established American principle that state and church should be kept separate, we oppose any interference by sectarian bodies in political affairs. Attempts to debar the people from rational amusement and recreation on Sundays, the employment of religious functionaries paid out of public moneys, the exemption of church property from taxation, and all similar tendencies to impose upon the state the support or recognition of any creed or denomination, we protest against with solemn and sincere concern.

As we oppose coercion in religious matters, so also we demand for every human being the right to use whatever language he prefers. Ignorance is not patriotism, and a citizen who understands two languages is better equipped mentally, as a man with two arms is more fit for work than he with only one. We recognize particularly in the German language a social heritage of priceless value, worth cultivating and preserving. However, all languages should be free to all people, and to make any language obligatory or to interdict any language is an invasion of human rights as would be the compulsion to accept or abjure any special religion.

Matters like these are implicit in the guarantee of mental liberty underlying the entire fabric of our civilization. Such liberty is the lubricant and dynamic of our material prosperity, to guard which is the primordial sphere of government. The state, with all its institutions and laws, defining rights and duties, is but a phase in the continuous evolution of society. Progress in political institutions is indicated by steadily growing security of the individual, equality of rights, as well as increasing influence and power of the masses of people.

When economic conditions are such as to produce, by privilege and monopoly granted to special groups, extremes like the millionaire and the pauper, the centralization of political power in certain classes becomes inevitable. For these reasons we approve all measures to keep open the avenues to economic equality. Opportunity must be afforded every human being to secure, by his mental and physical labor, a decent and comfortable livelihood in accordance with the prevailing standards of civilization, and likewise to share in the opulent heritage of past centuries.

We favor social institutions and legal enactments that will curb the exploitation of labor, securing to every worker the fruits of his toil and evincing greater regard for human life. Such legislation, putting human rights above private profit, is merely the practical modern application of the ancient commandments, "Thou shalt not steal" and "Thou shalt not kill."

In the full application of this principle we recognize a new extension of the doctrine of eminent domain, subordinating individual and corporate privilege to the general good. We hold that all natural resources, such as coal, oil, gas, ores, forest reserves, and water-power, are primarily the property of all the people, and cannot be monopolized without injury to all the people. Wherever such monopolies through their exploitations become unbearable, the government should adopt measures of regulation and taxation to restore such property to its original and rightful owners, to all the people. We hold further that all public utilities—such as railways, interstate or municipal, steam or electric, and telegraphs, telephone, and radio—being in their ultimate development essentially monopolies like the mail service, ought to be and are subject to the same power of regulation and taxation, so that, whenever the exactions of such monopolies become intolerable, such property may be gradually escheated to its ultimate and rightful owners, to all the people.

To this end we favor direct participation by the people in affairs of government, through the establishment of the most far-reaching democratic agencies for political control.

The greater and more extensive the rights of the citizens, and the more use they make of those rights, the greater will be the importance of clearly understanding cause and effect in relation to the people's social and economic needs. We hold, therefore, that the state, representing the whole people, has the duty of furthering the intellectual enlightenment of all by perfecting our school system, supporting scientific research, and safeguarding the freedom of teaching against all gag laws.

As history reveals the gradual ascendancy of right over might in the relations among individuals, so it should prevail among nations and races. For this reason we favor the removal of all barriers to trade and travel between one country and another, as well as the abrogation of all inhuman immigration laws. And we favor the settlement of international disputes by judicial procedure, approving all endeavors toward a harmonious and altruistic organization of all mankind.

We hold that every war, except defense against invasion, is a crime against the law of nations, and should be outlawed by every nation; that overgrown military and naval establishments are a menace to our own liberties and the peace of the world; and that the power of conscription, except to repel invasion, is a dangerous device of tyranny. Therefore we favor progressive disarmament, international arbitration treaties and tribunals, the abandonment of all selfish discriminations and historic hatreds, leading to the ultimate fraternal federation of the World.

These Turner principles, briefly summarized, are as follows: Liberty, against all oppression; Tolerance, against all fanaticism; Reason, against all superstition; Justice, against all exploitation! Free speech, free press, free assembly for the discussion of all questions, so that men and women may think unfettered and order their lives by the dictates of conscience—such is our ideal, which we strive to attain through "a sound mind in a sound body."

We are not a political party, obligating its members to any definite demands, but we urge upon them the duty of independent thought and action at all times; always to live as men and always to vote as citizens in harmony with the philosophy whose fundamental principles are here set forth.

THE NORMAL COLLEGE

The Normal College of the American Turnerbund, now conducting the eighteenth course since its removal to Indianapolis, has accomplished a remarkable change during the past year by introducing a third-year course. Fourteen of the former students returned to finish the third year's work.

Extensive improvements were made during the year at Camp Brosius, Elkhart Lake, Wis., where the summer sessions are being conducted, and where a four weeks' course in camping, etc., is given the regular class at the close of each school-year. The hotel operated in connection with the camp has found favor with members and friends of the Turnerbund, and was well attended during the season. It is hoped to make Elkhart Lake the Turner Chautauqua.

The Board of Trustees of the Normal College consists of the following: President, Franklin Vonnegut; Secretary, George Vonnegut; Treasurer, Carl H. Lieber; Theo. Stempfel; A. E. Kindervater, St. Louis; W. A. Stecher, Philadelphia; Henry Suder, Chicago; Dr. Carl Ziegler, Cincinnati; Emil Rath, President of the College and Dean of the Department of Theory and Practice of Physical Education; Dr. H. O. Pantzer, Dean of the Department of Anatomy, Physiology and Hygiene; W. L. Richardson, Dean of the Department of Letters and General Science.

The faculty, consisting of twenty-nine instructors, includes members of the teaching staff of the Indiana University School of Medicine, Butler College, and the Indianapolis high schools. The following courses are offered:

A four-year course leading to the degree of Bachelor of Physical Education (B.P.E.) and to certification as Teacher of Physical Training for Colleges and Universities.

Graduate courses leading to the degree of Master of Physical Education (M.P.E.).

A three-year course leading to certification as Teacher of Physical Education for High Schools.

A two-year course leading to certification as Teacher of Physical Training for Elementary and Junior High Schools.

An elementary one-year course, open to male non-matriculates who have attained a high degree of proficiency in gymnastics (gymnasts of the second or third grade) and met such additional requirements as may be prescribed, including a satisfactory knowledge of German. Students who complete this course receive a certificate attesting that they are qualified to teach physical education in schools maintained by societies of the American Turnerbund.

Summer courses, comprising special courses in the theory and practice of physical education and in related subjects. These courses are open to persons qualified to pursue profitably the work chosen by them. Credit and certificates will be given for work satisfactorily completed.

Complete information about these courses is given in the catalogue of the Normal College and in the special summer session program, sent on request.

Beginning with the year 1919-20 the Board of Trustees of the Normal College has offered seven scholarships to members of the American Turnerbund (one for each of the circuits), consisting of free tuition for the two-year course. Full information about these scholarships will be sent on request.

The 27th convention of the Turnerbund decided to offer similar scholarships to 22 members (one for each of the districts), without the high school education required for those mentioned above, consisting of free tuition for the elementary one-year course. Complete information will be sent on request.

WITH REGARD TO THE JAHN FUND

By the generosity of Turner Theodore Ahrens, of the National Executive Committee, the Jahn Educational Fund has been started. Turner Ahrens gave \$5,000.00, and the Fund has been increased steadily by voluntary gifts and subscriptions.

It is our purpose and hope to raise a sum not less than \$100,000.00 as a permanent endowment fund for the educational work of the Turnerbund. This fund is to be known as the Jahn Educational Fund of the American Turnerbund.

The Jahn Fund is to be administered by five perpetual trustees. These trustees are to select their own successors, whenever a vacancy occurs through death or resignation. The trustees are also to select an auxiliary advisory committee of five, from which such vacancies are to be filled, whenever they occur.

In this way it is intended to guard against fluctuations in policy or sudden change of administration, making it no easy matter, if at all possible, to divert the Jahn Fund from the purpose for which it was intended.

The National Executive Committee has designated its present officers as the first trustees of the Jahn Fund. Their names are: George Seibel, Dr. Hermann Groth, Ernest Herklotz, William Voelker, Henry J. Thier.

Principles of investment are being laid down to safeguard the Jahn Fund, and principles of administration will be defined so as to perform the most efficient service in perpetuity for the Turner cause.

Drives of all kinds are always going on to raise money for churches, colleges, asylums, and what not. They hire professional go-getters to hold you up. Usually 25 percent goes to the collector. Our Jahn Fund is different. It's our own. It's purely voluntary. All the money goes to the Fund. And the Fund is already a sure thing.

Members of Turner Societies will be encouraged to increase the Jahn Fund by legacies and gifts. Turner Societies will also be invited to make contributions to the Jahn Fund from time to time, by collections or by turning over to it the proceeds of some entertainment. The suggestion has been made that one day every year be designated as Jahn Day and devoted to the increasing of the Fund.

Only part of the total annual income from the Jahn Fund may be expended. At least one-third is to be added to the principal, so that the Fund will grow continually to meet the expanding needs of the work and provide against possible shrinkage of investment values.

The income, aside from the share set apart to augment the Jahn Fund, shall be used in various ways to extend the influence, maintain the principles, and assure the integrity of the Turnerbund as conceived by its founders. The Turner principles will be clearly defined, and the trustees of the Fund pledged to keep them inviolate.

While local needs must come first, and no individual or society should give unless they can afford to give, because we cannot do effective missionary work unless we are firmly established at home, here is an opportunity to nail the flag higher up on the mast. Our first duty is to support our local work loyally, just as every man's first duty is to feed his own family. After due

regard has been shown to this law of self-preservation, there should be consideration of the general good, which will be promoted by the Jahn Fund. When we stop thinking of small things, we shall attain to large things.

Every member and friend of our glorious American Turnerbund, now 75 years old, will be interested in the progress and perpetuation of our ideals and principles. They will, no doubt, welcome an opportunity to do something tangible toward the attainment of "a sound mind in a sound body," which we extol in our motto and strive after in the work of our societies.

They have an opportunity to do so now since the creation of the Jahn Educational Fund, which we hope to bring up to \$100,000.00 during 1925. All of us owe something to the future for the benefits we have received from the past. Physical education in America is the outgrowth of the Turnerbund's labors and sacrifices during nearly a century. Public health is the nation's most valuable asset, and the Turners have had a very great share in securing this priceless heritage to our people.

Out of their sacrifices and unselfish effort now comes the inspiration for greater things in days to come. "Many mickles make a muckle," says a Scotch proverb. The Jahn Fund has already received three subscriptions of \$1000 each, one of \$600 from a man who is not a Turner, four of \$500 each, four of \$250 each, one of two hundred dollars, and many of one hundred dollars, but the fellow who can give only 25 or 50 cents, and gives it, is no less deserving of honor and also is helping our cause, which is the cause of humanity.

A FEW WORDS ON MENTAL TRAINING

Every Turnverein is supposed to have a Committee on Mental Training and to devote some of its time and energies to the promotion of intellectual activities. Most of them do, but few of them send in any reports. New and simplified blanks have been furnished to all the societies, yet only 13 reports were sent in. This is perhaps due to the fact that the mental activities are not coordinated and systematized; many societies are doing fine work, and don't know it, or don't wish others to know it. For these, and even more for those that have lapsed into utter inactivity, a few suggestions are offered.

Every Turner should be interested in the promotion of Mental Training activities. Because there has been no regular guidance, there is apathy and discouragement. To overcome this, these hints are presented, not merely to the chairman of the committee, but to any Turner who desires to be active in this direction.

The first thing is to organize a class, no matter how small. The next step is to arrange for regular meetings, at least once a month, preferably every two weeks. These meetings should be continued, no matter how meager the attendance. Churches and Sunday Schools do not stop if only a few come. The few will grow to many if you don't quit, so try to make the meetings more and more interesting and sooner or later more will attend.

You can make the meetings interesting if you will give the matter a little thought. You do not need a lecturer to deliver a set discourse. Let everyone take part. Let everyone bring a brief clipping from some journal or magazine. Read this aloud. Get everyone's opinion. Is it true? If true, what's to be done about it? Or let everyone submit a question. What do the others think about it?

Encourage those who attend to write short papers and submit them for criticism.

Arrange a debate now and then upon some live topic. Don't be afraid of politics or religion, but insist that everybody keep his temper sweet.

Do not make the meetings too long. From an hour to 1½ hours is long enough.

If there is no Dramatic Club, bring up occasionally the question: Why not? Every Turnverein should have a Dramatic Club (Dramatische Sektion), which does not need to be large—five members, three men and two women, being enough for a start. If you want advice on organization, choice of plays, etc., write to Wm. Voelker, 1812 Evans Avenue, McKeesport, Pa.

If there is no Choral Club, bring up occasionally the question: Why not? An orchestra or band, a string quartet or a vocal quartet, can be organized. Let someone who knows something of music make the start.

Every Turnverein should have a German school or reading circle (Leseverein), to keep the knowledge of German alive. Select the best German reader to act as leader for the class or circle. Meet regularly and read good German books aloud. This will be found a splendid method of rousing interest in the Damen-Sektion. German authors highly recommended for the purpose are Hauff, Zschokke, Ebers, Dahn, Heyse, Freytag, Keller, Heer, and Ganghofer. Schiller's "Wilhelm Tell," Goethe's "Faust," and Lessing's "Nathan der Weise" should be read again and again. Books can be ordered through Richard Turt, Box 383, Pittsburgh, Pa., if you cannot get them in your city.

You can build up a German school very easily if you offer the room to some teacher who will organize a class, charge a moderate tuition fee, and pay the Society 30 or 40 per cent as rental. Look about you for a teacher—and try it.

Discuss the Society's Library. What books are in it? Are they properly catalogued? Are they ever used? If not, why not? Get busy and do that.

Every Turnverein should have its Library or Reading Room. If no separate room is available, a table with magazines and journals should be placed in one of the rooms used for social assembly. The publications should be such as will lead readers to think for themselves. It is well known that a large proportion of the American press is controlled by special interests which try to suppress news and prevent discussion that may attack their privileges. The Turner, to fulfill his duties as a citizen, should seek to get just such news and hear just such opinions, to offset the propaganda fed to us all the time by press, pulpit, and even radio. For this purpose a list of publications is appended, which deserve commendation, because they are apparently independent and liberal, giving unpopular opinions a chance to be heard, not merely bunk and propaganda.

Those who wish to become better acquainted with the Turner principles of liberty and progress should (if they understand German) read the "Turnzeitung" every week. It costs only \$3.00 a year. Address:
