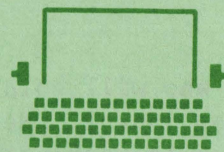


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IN THE BEGINNING. . .



The IUPUI University Theater will present an all-student production of Arthur Miller's "The Creation of the World and Other Business" at 8 p.m. Friday and Saturday and at 3 p.m. next Sunday in the Marott Building. Tickets are \$2 for students and \$2.50 for the public.

"Creation" is Miller's strange and humorous interpretation of the Biblical story of the world's first family. First produced in New York seven years ago, the play is one of his most recent works. (Among Miller's other notable successes are "The Crucible" and "Death of a Salesman.")

"Creation" is only the third all-student production in the 10-year history of the IUPUI University Theater. A student director is given full responsibility of the production as part of a Senior Honor Project. This IUPUI course is available only to students with proved capabilities in theater and a 3.5 grade point average.

Student director William Allis chose "Creation" for his project and, under the direction of J. Edgar Webb, associate professor, has produced his interpretation of Miller's play. "The play could be termed controversial because it deals with religion, unusual costumes, and bawdy language," Allis said.

The cast includes students Michael Perrey as God, James Berry as Adam, Jamie Safford as Eve, Gary Curto as Lucifer, Michael Fahling as Cain, Robert Norwood as Able, Mark Dessauer as Chemuel, Don Behringer as Raphael, and Christopher Michael as Asrael.

The stage design for this production was created by sophomore Kelli Jo Kingsley, through a competition for the position in her "Advanced Stagecraft and Scenic Design" course. Her set uses a polyurethane foam to produce a heaven-like effect. Senior Martha Naughton designed the costumes for the Biblical characters, giving body stockings and leotards to the heavenly characters and tunic styles to the mundane characters.

TRUSTEES NAME PAYNTER TO WISHARD POST: APPROVE OTHER PROJECTS

Dr. William T. Paynter, Indiana state health commissioner since 1973, has been named associate dean of the I.U. School of Medicine and medical director of Wishard Memorial Hospital. The hospital is under the medical management of the School of Medicine through a contract with the Health and Hospital Corporation of Marion County. The appointment was made April 7 at the I.U. trustees' meeting at the South Bend campus.

Paynter, who will hold the rank of professor of psychiatry, will assume his new duties June 1. He succeeds Dr. Robert Van Hoek, who resigned a year ago to take a position in Washington, D.C. School of Medicine Dean Steven C. Beering has been serving as medical director in the interim with the assistance of Dr. John L. Glover, chief of surgery at Wishard.

Besides his health commissioner's position, Dr. Paynter also has served as director of the State Health Planning and Development Agency since 1976. A member of numerous professional organizations and health-related groups, Dr. Paynter received both his bachelor of science and M.D. degrees from I.U.

Among other personnel actions, the trustees approved the following:

James E. Weigand, administrative assistant to the president and professor of science education, as dean of the I.U. School of Continuing Studies;

Joseph P. Giusti, director of the Beaver campus of Pennsylvania State University, as chancellor of I.U.-P.U. at Fort Wayne;

P. Ronald Stephenson, associate professor of marketing, the additional appointment as chairperson of the Undergraduate Program, School of Business;

P. Nicholas Kellum, dean of the School of Physical Education, the additional appointment as associate dean of the School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation.

The trustees also approved an increase in student fees, effective in August. For the Indianapolis campus, resident undergraduate students in the non-health division will be charged \$26 per credit hour, up \$2. The undergraduate non-resident fee will be \$59, up \$4. The School of Medicine's resident annual rate will go from \$1,240 to \$1,320, the School of Dentistry's resident annual rate from \$1,080 to \$1,160.

Planning for four projects on the Indianapolis campus also received trustee approval:

The firm of James Associates of Indianapolis was named to continue planning services for the computer facilities to be housed in the Engineering and Technology Building. Estimated project cost is \$1,115,396. Funding has been approved by the Indiana General Assembly;

McGuire and Shook Corporation of Indianapolis was named to proceed with the planning to continue the remodeling and conversion of the Coleman Hospital building for the Student-Employee Health Service and academic and administrative facilities for the Division of Allied Health Sciences. Estimated cost of this phase of the renovation is \$1,300,518, which has been approved by the General Assembly;

The School of Dentistry plans to renovate its 28-unit Dental Hygiene Clinic, which has not been updated since it was built 19 years ago. Estimated cost of the project is \$360,000 and funding will come from the university's 1977-79 repair and rehabilitation funds;

The Ellerbe firm of Bloomington, Minn., was approved by the board for planning, general architectural and engineering services for the proposed addition to the Riley Hospital for Children. Funding for the planning work will come from gifts through the Riley Memorial Association.
