### OPEN HOUSE FOR REJUVENATED COLEMAN

Shiny and new again, the refurbished, renovated and renewed Coleman Hospital, now Coleman Hall, is back in service housing the <u>Division of Allied Health Sciences</u> of the I.U. School of Medicine.

To celebrate their new quarters, and to let everyone know how fine they are, the Division will hold an open house from 1 to 3 p.m. this Wednesday (April 22), with tours of the building starting from the lobby every half-hour. Everyone is invited.

"The Indiana University Division of Allied Health Sciences comprises all the recognized allied health disciplines and is represented on a statewide basis through the I.U. Regional Campus System," Dean Steven C. Beering of the School of Medicine pointed out. "The Coleman renovation will provide a new headquarters for the division in one strategic location," he said. A total of 612 students are enrolled in its various programs.

About half of the allied health science teaching will be concentrated in Coleman. "Acquisition of this magnificent facility for allied health already has strengthened the morale of faculty and staff members in the entire division, Dr. Edward R. Pierce, director of the division, said.

## NEW JOURNAL EDITED BY GRAY

The <u>Journal of the Early Republic</u>, edited by Ralph D. Gray, professor of history, has joined the ranks of publications that form the scholarship of history. It is the official publication of the Society for Historians for the Early American Republic.

To mark the publication of the first issue this month, the Center for American Studies will sponsor a symposium and public lecture featuring Edward Pessen, distinguished professor of history at Baruch College (City University of New York). Pessen will speak at 8:15 p.m. Monday (April 20) in Lecture Hall 101 on "How Democratic Was Jacksonian Democracy?" The topic also will be the subject of an interdisciplinary symposium led by Christoph K. Lohmann, director of the American Studies Program, and Irene D. Neu, professor of history, both from I.U.-Bloomington, and Sue K. Hammersmith, assistant professor of sociology, and Patrick J. McGeever, associate professor of political science, both from IUPUI, and others. The symposium will continue at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday at Conner Prairie Farm, with discussions centering on what daily life was really like in the era depicted by that museum.
