#### ENROLLMENT NOTES

Fall enrollment at IUPUI reached 16,792 students, a 1.3 per cent increase from the 16,580 students who enrolled at/IUPUI last fall, according to preliminary figures reported by I.U. President John W. Ryan.

h Preliminary fall enrollment figures for the Indiana University state-wide campus system show a total of 67,907 students, a .7 per cent gain of 459 students since last fall, he said. President Ryan said that enrollment increases were recorded on five of the eight I.U. campuses, while the other three showed slight declines from last year.

1 Dr. Maynard K. Hine, chancellor of IUPUI, said some further increases are expected in Indianapolis when final reports are completed for students who are transferring or registering late for classes.

Dr. Ryan said that for the last five years the university's enrollment projections -- the basis upon which budgets were built -- have been accurate, but this year's enrollment is less than anticipated. In view of this experience, he said, this year's enrollment seems to have been affected by special or temporary factors. It seems unlikely, said Dr. Ryan, that they will alter the long-range planning for the decade ahead.

At IUPUI Dr. Hine said studies have begun to determine how such factors as limitations on the military draft and improvements in the national and local economies have affected enrollment.

Even though enrollment is up for the I.U. system, Dr. Ryan said that additional studies are under way to analyze why the increase was not as much as anticipated. Belt tightening throughout the I.U. system is indicated, he said.

Budgetary planning had been predicted on a state-wide enrollment of 71,585 for this year, or 3,678 more students than have so far been accounted for, a difference of 5.1 per cent.

Following are the preliminary totals by campuses as of September 8:

Bloomington, 30,836, up 118 students (.3 per cent) IUPUI, 16,792, up 212 (1.3 per cent) South Bend, 5,295, down 150 (2.8 per cent) Northwest (Gary), 4,784, up 30 (.1 per cent) Fort Wayne, 4,634, up 232 (5.3 per cent) Southeast (Jeffersonville), 2,730, up 41 (1.5 per cent) Kokomo, 2,112, down 6 (.3 per cent) East (Richmond) 698, down 18 (.3 per cent) Evansville (one class), 26, unchanged

"Naturally, the short-fall in the predicted enrollment will put an economic burden on all campuses," Dr. Ryan said. "One of the sources of income upon which the budgets were figured is the fees paid by students. Administrative officers on all campuses have been instructed to keep operation costs in line with actual income."

(Fees at Bloomington amount to \$325 per semester for in-state students, and \$745 for out-of-state students. Fees at the other campuses are \$20 per semester hour for in-state undergraduate students and \$40 per semester hour for out-of-staters.)

Ryan pointed out that the portion of the biennial operating budget paid by student fees has risen from 14 per cent in 1962 to 27.5 per cent this year. "Thus, "he said, "while enrollment is up, the fact that enrollment did not rise as much as predicted calls for stringency in all departments."
