SEREGNY'S NEH GRANT WILL ENHANCE RUSSIAN PEASANT STUDIES

Scott J. Seregny, assistant professor of history, is the only professor in Indiana to receive a \$3,500 National Endowment for the Humanities summer grant, and with it, he will do more research on the tsarist Russian peasantry he began studying 10 years ago. Among the many interesting facts he discovered while sifting through mounds of unorganized data in archives in the Soviet Union, Seregny found that, contrary to historical accounts, peasants of early 20th Century Russia organized themselves and intelligently voiced their needs. Considered a scholar in Russian and European history, Scott studied at Lenningrad State University in 1977-78 and was invited by Soviets officials to search the books, memoirs and newspaper accounts of the tsarist archives. Results of his recent grant research will be published next year in an issue of Slavic Review, and it will be part of a book he is writing about the Russian peasantry .-- Jim Grim



Students Find Mixed Spanish Awareness Downtown

Students from all parts of Indiana participated in a weeklong intensive language session at IUPUI from July 6-10. Organized by the Pan American Events and Language Programs Office, the session sought to "fine tune" the 165 participants' skills in speaking and understanding Spanish. During the Pan American Games, the students from this program will work at the Pan American Village.

An emphasis during the week was on giving and taking messages in Spanish and English, converting messages from one language to the other, being able to provide information, and giving and following directions in Spanish.

A highlight of the week was a trip to downtown Indianapolis. Students were diverted into 16 groups and given sets of instructions to follow. When each group arrived at each one of the five sites on their routes, two students from each group role-played a situation in which one was a Spanish speaker and the other was an interpreter. They were looking for some one at each location who spoke Spanish. If they found someone, they were to get that person's name. Students found that at about half of the sites visited, there was someone who spoke some Spanish.

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How to Host and Understand Our Latin American Guests

There are many stereotyping ideas about Latin American people. It is important that these are clarified or that at least more information on these is known. A list of some of these follow:

- 1. **The concept of "America".**—America is the name for the western hemisphere. In the U.S., the term is used to describe the country. The term in Latin America refers to all of the continent and consequently everyone from this continent is an American.
- 2. **The concept of time.**—In many countries of the world, time is not as pressing as in the U.S. Tardiness many times is a result of poor transportation services, limited resources to get places (money, personal cars, etc.) or conveniences that help in being ready promptly and easily. Because of these realities, people normally allow more time for travel.
- 3. "Piropos" (sweet sayings to a woman).—This is a cultural practice to exalt a woman's good looks or qualities, very respectful at times and by no means vicious. Athletes, trainers, coaches, delegates and visitors will by no means try to offend nor hurt a person. It might be "machista", but Latin American men are protective and sometimes even patronizing of women.
- 4. **Machismo.**—Not a unique feature to Latin American men. Not necessarily negative always, even encouraged by women in certain cultural practices. Courtesy is an important aspect of "macho" man, (i.e.: opening a door, paying for a meal, pulling a chair, offering a handerchief, etc. . . .)
- 5. **Space and touching.**—Distance while speaking to another person is not a concern for many cultures. In Latin America, people stand rather close to one another even if they are not "good old friends". It is not meant to be offensive or distracting, it is not a "come-on". Touching another person on the shoulder, arm or back is normal among Latin Americans. Even a little push or pat is accepted.
- 6. **Loud versus quiet.**—Often people will whistle or mimick another, or just loudly call another. This is nothing to be alarmed about. Joking and kidding is part of the Latin American spirit, but once again it depends on the individual. If you find a group of Latin American people that are happy, this feeling will be displayed. Please don't be surprised if you see couples of men or women embraced and happily sharing anecdotes or events. Expressing one's feelings is a normal human reaction. Some cultures are more reserved than others and the degree of expression varies.

Being a good host is important. By being informed and recognizing the fact that we all live under one sun portrays a positive image of the host. It is essential to have a good disposition to understand others' cultural practices.

Health for the Americas

Speakers from the Pan American Health Organization will describe the progress of the primary health care approach in their respective countries.
