


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#### MARK YOUR CALENDARS NOW FOR ANNUAL JUPUI ZOO NIGHT

Your good stewardship has helped provide

treatment for more than 170 kids from all over Indiana who suffered burns in the past 3 1/2 years. The burn unit not only offers the latest in treatment, but offers a playroom that overlooks the beautiful atrium in Riley, an important visual link for children who must be isolated to prevent infection. 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#### HERRON WELCOMES 12 AFRICANS IN THE ARTS

Herron School of Art was set to play host last week to 12 African artists, art educators and writers on the arts, who were scheduled to visit the city, the Broad Ripple art fair, the IMA. The "Arts and American Society" group also was to participate in seminars with Herron Dean William Voos and others. Their visit coincided with the opening May 17 of the African-American exhibit at Herron by artists Carol White and "Bing" Davis. Cities on the group's U.S. tour included Washington, D.C., Phoenix, San Francisco, Minneapolis, Columbus (Ohio) and New York City.

#### HONORS AND ACCOLADES (AT LAST)

As things wind down a bit from a hectic academic year, there is finally a little space here to acknowledge the contributions and awards made by some of the people we hear about on campus. Some off-campus awards include:

The Tony and Mary Hulman Health Achievement Award for contributions to preventive medicine and public health went to Karen Bruner Stroup, research associate and coordinator of the Automotive Safety for Children Program and the education coordinator for Kiwanis Trauma Life Center Injury Prevention and Control Program, both at Riley Hospital.

The Indiana Humanities Council awarded \$2,500 project support grants to each of four 1991 Public Humanities Fellowships recipients who include, from this campus, Professor Dorothy B. Webb, director of youth theater, IUPUI University Theatre, and to Sharon J. Hamilton-Wieler, assistant professor of English.

IUPUI itself gleaned an honorable mention in the annual National Collegiate Alcohol Awareness Week contest for our alcohol abuse prevention program coordinated by the IUPUI Wellness Education Committee.

The Div. of Continuing Studies won a bronze award in the 1991 National University Continuing Education Association Marketing and Promotion Div. The award recognized a radio ad on WKIR that was produced to let people know that the division's new catalog would be an insert in the Indianapolis Sunday Star.

For their efforts to increase contract opportunities with minority businesses, Ann Miller and Robert Halter, IUPUI Purchasing Services buyers, received awards from the Indiana Regional Minority Supplier Development Council.

The Association for the Education of Teachers in Science awarded Charles R. Barman, School of Education, a first-place award of \$500 and a plaque for his paper entitled "An Expanded View of the Learning Cycle: New Ideas About an Effective Teaching Strategy."

For her extensive philanthropic and organizational leadership, Associate Dean of the Faculties Carol D. Nathan was named the 1991 Outstanding Professional Woman of the Year by the Altrusa Club.

And, finally, from off campus, the Indiana Medical History Museum is one of seven Hoosier museums to receive a grant in the amount of 10 percent of its operating budget from the Institute of Museum Services, the only federal source of general operating support for U.S. museums.
