Stephen B. Leapman, M.D., executive associate dean for educational affairs, is this year's speaker. He will present "Thoughts About Our Professional Team." A surgeon, Dr. Leapman has taught at IUSM for 31 years.

Grants and awards to Indiana University for research and other sponsored programs increased 21 percent in the 2007-08 fiscal year to a record total of \$525.3 million. Of that, \$263.4 million came from federal sources, such as the National Institutes of Health and National Science Foundation -- a 25 percent increase over the previous year. That total was also a new record for IU.

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Donation to increase number of minority physicians

Minorities wishing to pursue a career in medicine have received a major boost in their efforts. The Wishard Foundation has received a \$2 million grant from Lilly Endowment Inc. to assist in efforts to increase the number of minority physicians trained in Indiana.

The Endowment awarded the grant for the George H. Rawls, M.D. Scholarship Fund, which helps to foster the growing number of minorities interested in pursuing medical training at IUSM.

In addition, IU Medical Group – Primary Care (IUMG-PC) has committed a \$2 million challenge grant for the scholarship's endowment, providing one additional dollar for every two dollars raised. The Wishard Foundation seeks to raise a total of \$4 million to maximize this challenge grant. When completed, it is estimated that the \$6 million endowment will provide full tuition grants for 10 minority students in perpetuity.

In Indiana, less than four percent of physicians are African American and less than three percent are Hispanic.

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Faculty orientation sessions

Victoria L. Champion, DNS, RN, associate dean for research, Edward W. and Sara Stam Cullipher Endowed Chair, Mary Margaret Walther Distinguished Professor at the Indiana University School of Nursing was recently appointed to the National Cancer Advisory Board. This is a six-year appointment, ending in 2014. The National Cancer Advisory Board is an 18-member board that advises the secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services and the director of the National Cancer Institute. Members include leaders from the health and scientific disciplines as well as the fields of public policy, law, health policy, economics and management and the environment. Dr. Champion's primary research interest is behavioral oncology.

IU Distinguished Professor and IUPUI Chancellor's Professor **Bernardino Ghetti**, MD, has been honored by the Alzheimer's Association with the Henry M. Wisniewski Award for Lifetime Achievement in Alzheimer's Disease Research. The award was presented July 27 during the 11th International Conference on Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders in Chicago. Dr. Ghetti has spent the past 40 years studying the pathology, biochemical and molecular mechanisms of dementias. The Wisniewski lifetime achievement award is particularly significant to Dr. Ghetti, since Dr. Wisniewski was a mentor to Dr. Ghetti when he was a graduate fellow at Albert Einstein College.

Dan Meldrum, MD, associate professor of surgery and physiology, has been appointed a regular (permanent) member of the NIH Study Section for Myocardial Ischemia and Metabolism (MIM).

Donald Orr, MD, professor of pediatrics and the founding director of the Section of Adolescent Medicine at IUSM and Riley Hospital, has been selected to receive the 2008 Adele Dellenbaugh Hoffmann Award from the American Academy of Pediatrics. This award is given to an individual who exemplifies excellence in the field of adolescent health and advocates for adolescents to improve the delivery of their health care. Dr. Orr started the section of adolescent medicine when he joined the faculty in 1983. Now, the section provides more than 40,000 adolescent clinical visits per year, is one of the preeminent academic training programs in the country and brings in over \$3 million per year in research support. Dr. Orr will receive the award at the AAP annual National Conference and Exhibition in Boston in October.

Jennifer Walthall, MD, a faculty attending in the departments of emergency medicine and pediatrics, recently received the Emergency Medicine Outstanding Teaching Faculty of the Year award. This award is given annually by the Emergency Medicine Residency Program for the outstanding teacher in the Methodist Emergency Medicine and Trauma Center (EMTC). Dr. Walthall spends six months of each year as a member of the Riley Pediatric Hospitalist Program and six months as an emergency medicine attending in the Methodist EMTC.

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This week on Sound Medicine

A new machine designed to help athletes get a more complete muscular stretch will make its debut at the 2008 Beijing Olympics, which open Aug. 8. Arizona chiropractor Mike Reed, the inventor of the Powerstretch, says the new device allows individuals to perform 20 minutes worth of stretches in just 3 minutes. He says Powerstretch will have people touching their toes who haven't in years. And, unique as it may sound, the stretching is literally being done by motors.

Alan Rogol, MD, PhD, a professor of clinical pediatrics at the University of Virginia and the IU School of Medicine, will talk about another hot Olympoic topic – the effects of growth hormone on athletic performance.

Cholesterol lowering drugs for children will be discussed by Beatrice Golomb, MD, PhD, associate professor of medicine at the University of California, San Diego, and Rachel Vreeman, MD, assistant professor of pediatrics at IUSM. Their comments are in response to the recommendation by the American Academy of Pediatrics that some children as young as 8 years of age should receive cholesterol lowering drugs.

Barbara V. Romberg, PhD, a clinical psychologist from Washington, D.C., is the founder of Give An Hour. The group of 1,200 mental health professionals donate one hour of free care a week to troops, veterans or family members. They have to commit to doing it for a year.

Romberg, in cooperation with the American Psychiatric Foundation, hopes to find 40,000 volunteers over the next three years, or about 10 percent of available civilian professionals. The effort to get the word out to those who need the help and to recruit and train volunteers is being backed by a \$1 million grant from the Lilly Foundation.
