VIOLIN MEDALIST TO RETURN

Mihaela Martin, the gold medal winner of the 1982
International Violin Competition of Indianapolis,
will return to present a recital at Clowes Hall at
3 p.m. April 24, one week before her Carnegie Hall debut.
The 24-year-old Romanian violinist outshone the 45 other
"stars" of the violin world last September during the twoweek competition that was sponsored by Cathedral Arts. As the
first laureate, Miss Martin won a gold medal, a Vox Cum Laude
record release, \$10,000 in prize money and a Carnegie Hall debut
along with numerous other recitals and performances with orchestras in North America and Europe. During her recent concert
appearances Miss Martin has amassed critical acclaim.

Miss Martin's Vox Cum Laude recording is expected to be released at the time of her Indianapolis recital which previews her Carnegie Hall debut. The Indianapolis audience will have the opportunity to hear her perform two of the works that she recorded for Vox, Schubert's Sonata for Violin and Piano in A Major, D.574, and Stravinsky's Divertimento for Violin and Piano (1932). She also will play Leclair's Sonata for Violin and Piano, Op. 9, No. 3 in D Major and Beethoven's Sonata for Violin and Piano, Op. 30, No. 7 in C minor. She will be accompanied by the distinguished pianist Paul Ostrovsky.

Miss Martin will be playing one of the world's rarest violins, a Joseph Guarneri del Gesu, until recently the concert violin of Isaac Stern. Tickets now are on sale at Clowes Hall. For information call 926-5551.

SOCIAL AWARENESS WEEK PLANNED

Talks by two national public interest lawyers, Ramsey Clark and Mark Green, will highlight a week-long focus on social issues that include nuclear war, rape, El Salvador and U.S. foreign policy during the third annual Social Awareness Week, April 4-9, being organized by the IUPUI Progressive Student Union. Student groups, faculty and more than 20 nationally affiliated activist groups with chapters in Indianapolis also will participate.

Clark, the controversial former U.S. attorney general under President Lyndon Johnson, will speak April 6 at 8 p.m. on "A Critical Look at U.S. Foreign Policy." Green, who heads the Democracy Project and who has co-written many articles with Ralph Nader, will speak at 8 p.m. April 7 on "Winning Back America." They will speak in the Lecture Hall.

Social Awareness Week begins April 4 with participation in a caravan to Anderson in support of the Rev. Jesse Jackson's movement for solidarity action for the unemployed. At 8 p.m. representatives from the Protestant, Catholic and Jewish

faiths will give positions on nuclear disarmament in "Judeo-Christian Perspectives on Peace" in Room 100 of the Lecture Hall. The rest of the week will be filled with films, events and speakers. Schedules of events and their locations will be posted, or for information call ext. 4531.

CULTURAL EVOLUTION EXPLORED

What is our future as civilized beings? Are we on a path to destruction or will the human race develop wisdom enough to know what actions will lead to survival?

That is the subject of a newly published book (Pergamon Press of Oxford, England) written by IUPUI Professor of Speech-Theatre-Communications Richard Curtis. The book is entitled "Evolution or Extinction--The Choice Before Us," and it is a deep look at the problem from a "systems theory" perspective.

Curtis believes the survival of mankind depends on society's ability to agree on a universal value system and to guide wisely its increasing ability to use energy. He developed the book over an eight-year period and uses it as a text for two classes on the future that he teaches for Weekend College. The text and classes, he says, try to merge the sciences and humanities into an interdisciplinary study of the future.
