Huckelberry--were invited to the School of Dentistry to have a look around and to give faculty, staff and students a chance to show their appreciation for the couple's most recent contribution to the School.

A major gift from the retired dentist and his wife, Ama, has made possible the redecoration of the patient admitting and assignment area of the Department of Dental Diagnostic Sciences in the newest wing on the first floor. An afternoon reception in the Huckelberrys' honor on June 10 included words of thanks from Dean H. William Gilmore, Dr. Steven Bricker, chairman of dental diagnostic sciences, and Gerald L. Bepko, IU vice president at Indianapolis, who spoke of "a proud day" for the School of Dentistry.

A graduate of the Class of 1924, Dr. Huckelberry, together with Chancellor Herman B Wells, founded the IUSD Alumni Association more than 40 years ago. Dr. Huckelberry practiced general dentistry in Indianapolis for 55 years before retiring in 1979, and has served the dental profession in many capacities. Ama Huckelberry has been a guiding force in auxiliary organizations at state and national levels.






Pomp, Circumstance, and the 1987 Grads

She gathers them from field, wood, and garden, and creates showpieces that range from eye-catching to eye-popping. Long known around the School for her green thumb, Vivian can turn a vase and one trip to the flower patch into a work of art. One can only imagine what her yard must look like, where some 50 varieties of flowers are currently in bloom. Vivian, who lives in the

country near Martinsville, starts in early spring arranging pussy willows from trees that she has raised from cuttings, and winds up in the fall going heavy on the Mums. In between is a breathtaking cascade of colors, textures and shapes. When she was asked to reveal the contents of one lovely bouquet in the library, Vivian brushed her hand gently through the arrangement, clicking off the names as easily as if she were identifying her children: baby's-breath, Shasta and glorosia daisies, coreopsis, wild berries, orange and lavender cosmos, hearty sweet pea, Queen Anne's lace, dill, rabbit ears, asparagus fern, Lilliput xenias, corabell, and calendula.

But the lemon lillies, spice pinks and countless other "belles fleurs" may be scarce from now on, because Vivian Haggard has departed from the dental school. We won't call it retirement—she did that officially in 1981, after serving as recorder of graduate and postgraduate education for 12 years. On July 10, 1987, Vivian wrapped up an extra four years of full-time employment as secretary of the Department of Periodontics, a position that pulled her back into the dental school mainstream at a time when she was ready to accept such an atypical "post-retirement" challenge. She also saw it as an opportunity to work with Dr. Timothy J. O'Leary, then head of the department and a favorite faculty member with whom she had worked in her job as recorder.

Vivian's reputation as a pro in the flower garden may be taken a step further in her post-post-retirement days. Her son, Bert, has asked her to run his garden shop outside the Waverly Market at State Road 37 and highway 144. Sounds like the perfect diversion for a woman who has spent a lifetime on the go and has no intention of letting a little thing like retirement slow her down now. We wish the very best to this outstanding employee and friend of the School.

Dean's Message

The summer brings time to plan new programs for the coming school year, and augment those already in existence. The time after graduation and boards also provides a "catching up" period for students who are behind in requirements, as well as an opportunity to get a jump on the next academic year by beginning treatment of new patients. Many advances have been made by the faculty toward an increasingly dynamic curriculum, and new policies and programs are needed to support the growth. In August there will be 75 new students in the first year predoctoral class, 30 in postgraduate studies, 30 in dental hygiene, and 22 in dental assisting. Enrollment in dental education continues to drop. This year all four classes of predoctoral students will be located in the School of Dentistry building.

All remodeling in the building is taking longer (and costing more) than predicted. By August the Special Care Clinic and the basement laboratory should be ready for service. In all areas, it is important that environmental controls be well established and properly observed so that our facility remains up to date. Your patience with the workers, the clutter, and the inconvenience is appreciated.

The Infection Control Committee continues working with an unwavering commitment to prevent disease transmission in the school. More funds are budgeted each year to purchase the materials and hire the personnel necessary to maintain a controlled facility. **Professor Charles J. Palenik** and his Committee will be reviewing protocols with all departments for barrier techniques and disposal of soiled products. Each department must carefully monitor infection control in the clinics and review the Committee's policies. New guidelines on infection control have been adopted by the American Dental Association and will be distributed to all faculty and staff.

An inoculation program to prevent hepatitis will be offered soon for all personnel in the building who have contact with patients or supplies. Hepatax vaccine will be made available for the three-stage immunization. The vaccine is safe and effective, and the protection is necessary for all staff and students. Watch for the announcement and be certain you have the positive test validating your immunization.

The Curriculum Committee, under direction of **Dr. Donald R. Tharp**, has been exceptionally active. A new program on hospital procedures and observation of medical emergencies has been devised. With the aid of **Dr. Donald E. Arens**, a course in TMJ has been planned and assigned to the department of prosthodontics. Plans are being made also to update the offerings in anesthesia and pain control. A new predoctoral and continuing education unit in I.V. sedation is being organized which will be one of the first in this part of the country.

I am pleased to announce that **Dr. LaForrest D. Garner** has accepted a position as associate dean for student minority services at the School of Dentistry, effective immediately. Dr. Garner, who has chaired the orthodontics department since 1970, will bring new direction and vision to the recruitment of minority students at IUSD. He will continue as acting chairman until the Search and Screen Committee recommends a candidate for chairman of orthodontics.

Expansion of research is occurring in all departments through the efforts of **Dr. George K. Stookey**, acting associate dean for research, and the new Research Committee. The Committee goals include assisting the faculty in preparing protocols and obtaining funds. Research coordinators are being identified for each department to accelerate faculty and staff involvement into new or expanded studies. All tenured faculty will be given regular time to investigate their subjects, and the opportunities for sharing information will be opened to all health care faculties on the campus. Any suggestions or queries should be directed to the Research Committee.

My thanks go to the librarians for housing the Dean's Office staff for much of the summer. While our offices are being remodeled it is enjoyable to work again in the basement stacks, where I spent many hours during my graduate study. Although my desk is at the lowest level in the building, it is worth the change to be working with an impressive library staff. Drop in if you can find us!

Twelve Years of Filling Tall Orders: A Farewell to Robert L. Wegner

A dozen years after assuming the role of supervisor of stores and acquisitions at the dental school, and 29 years to the day after becoming an employee of Indiana University, Robert L. Wegner plans to retire on July 31. Oh, that we could talk him out of it!

Those of us who routinely weave a tangled web when trying to place a simple order for typewriter ribbon, p.i.p. paste, or tongue depressors, know that Bob will unsnarl the mess and won't complain. When we ask for the 50th time, "Do you need a carbon?" or, worse, "Do I need a signature?"—he smiles broadly and tells us. Again. When we act as if we don't know a Blue Req from a blue moon, Bob never holds it against us. "I belong to a service organization," he says, "and I bend over backward to do my job. My goal is to please everybody and make sure things run as they should." Bob Wegner has probably come closer to filling that tall order than almost anyone.

Bob is a lifelong resident of Indianapolis who was a Radioman 2nd Class in the U.S. Navy. He served two of his three years on assignment overseas. He's been married to his wife, Carolyn, since 1959 and has two grown daughters, Cheryl and Julia, and a grandson, Daniel. He held various jobs in the city before taking a position on campus as administrator of the Institute of Psychiatric Research, where he remained for 17 years. He transferred to the dental school in 1975.

A few years ago a supply item arrived at the School that caught Bob's eye. "A tie tack came in shaped like a molar," he says. "We bought a few and sold them. Then Atef Tawadros, a dental student at the time (DDS '81), suggested that I put an IU logo in the middle of the molar." Bob picked up on the idea and wound up setting off a trend. He created a design and lined up a company to put the logo on all kinds of tooth-shaped pins, tie tacks, key chains, charms and pendants. Today he has 22 styles and has sold about 3,000 pieces so far, mostly in the building but also at alumni events and the state convention. He was honored by the IUSD Alumni Association last September at the Fall Dental Alumni Conference Banquet for coming up with an idea that has carried the IU name worldwide. "Being recognized in front of hundreds of people at the Conference, I realized that I had made a real contribution to the School."

Robert L. Wegner has contributed to Indiana University and the School of Dentistry in many other ways, through 29 years of dedicated service. Congratulations to a man who has more than earned his retirement!

IUSD Employees Spread the Word On Infant and Toddler Dental Care

A mobile program to educate mothers on oral health care of infants and toddlers has been created by pediatric dentistry employees JoAnn Heasley and Elizabeth Hatcher, under the direction of Dr. Hala Z. Henderson, chairman of undergraduate pediatric dentistry and head of the School's Infant Dental Care program.

Their goal, says Elizabeth, who is the department's special projects coordinator, is to "teach mothers to raise caries-free children and motivate them to take their children to the dentist at an early age." She and JoAnn, infant dental care coordinator, have put together a program that will promote infant dental health "on the road."

The information is targeted at mothers with youngsters under the age of three and expectant mothers. They are encouraged to bring their babies along to course locations, chosen by the requesting group. A 25-minute slide presentation is included, along with an open question-and-answer period. "We hope to have lots of audience participation," Elizabeth says.

A trial run last month at the School attracted a group of female dental students and staff members. Other classes are scheduled at the School and at Humana Hospital in July.

Second Annual Teleconference

Indiana dentists and their staff members gathered at sites all over the state on April 9 for a course on how to recognize liability risks in the dental office--a growing concern of dental health care professionals--and ways of avoiding unnecessary lawsuits.

"Quality Dentistry = Liability Reduction" was the subject of the Second Annual Teleconference, co-sponsored by the Indiana State Board of Health, Indiana University School of Dentistry, and the Indiana Dental Association, and produced by the Indiana University School of Medicine Medical Educational Resources Program.

Offered at 14 sites throughout the state, the course included televised presentations by Drs. Steven L. Bricker, Michael A. Cochran, Jack E. Schaaf, Susan L. Zunt, and Timothy J. O'Leary, of the IU School of Dentistry faculty; Brenda J. Harman, D.D.S., of the American Dental Association; Jerry R. Jenkins, J.D., attorney for the Indiana Dental Association; Dorothy J. Frapwell, J.D., attorney for Indiana University; and Barbara M. McNutt, J.D., deputy director of the Health Professions Bureau.

A wealth of current information on dentistry and Indiana dental law was provided that the dental team could put to immediate use in the dental practice. Among topics discussed were: legal rights of patients and dentists, the legally correct dental record, the role of the State Board of Dental Examiners in dental litigation, and the "How To's" of oral and periodontal examinations.

Dr. Detamore came to IU after serving in the United States Air Force from 1948 to 1971. His Air Force career included assignments in the United States, England and Spain. He is a 1948 graduate of Northwestern University Dental School with postdoctoral training at Tufts University School of Dental Medicine and residency training at USAF Hospital, Lackland Air Force Base, Texas. He achieved Diplomate status in the American Board of Periodontology in 1959. He is a member of Theta Theta Chapter of OKU. A sports aficianado of rare intensity (even by Hoosier standards), Dr. Detamore ranks among the School's best hallway sports commentators. He will be fondly remembered for his enthusiastic (and expert) recapping and analyzing of events. Dr. Detamore retires July 31.
