FELLOWSHIPS AVAILABLE

The National Science Foundation has Graduate Fellowships available for students who are citizens of the United States and have been admitted to graduate status by the institution they select for study and, too, as of Fall 1972 will not have completed more than one year of full or part time graduate study. The stipends are \$3,600 for a 12-month tenure or \$300 per month and without dependency allowances.

These fellowships are available for study or work leading to masters or doctoral degrees in the mathematical, physical, medical, biological, engineering, social sciences, and in the history and philosophy of science. Awards are not made in clinical, education, or business fields or history or social work or work leading to the M.D. or D.D.S.
