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UNIT PROVIDES COMPREHENSIVE CARE FOR PARALYZED PATIENTS

A major new center for the rehabilitation of partially and totally paralyzed patients who suffer from severe spinal cord injuries has been developed over the past year and half by the I.U. School of Medicine.

"This is an exciting and dynamic development in the treatment and rehabilitation of paraplegics and quadriplegics," said Dr. Steven C. Beering, medical school dean.

The Spinal Cord Rehabilitation Unit, on the fourth floor of University Hospital, was made possible by a grant from the Indiana Vocational Rehabilitation Services.

The grant was used to redesign a treatment area for use by persons in wheelchairs and to equip it with all electric beds and accessory equipment to make it an accessible and therapeutic environment.

The planners of the unit included representatives of each discipline that would be involved in the rehabilitation program. They felt it would be beneficial to have patients with similar injuries placed together. This environment would facilitate acceptance of injury and promote rehabilitations.

Dr. James L. Babcock, orthopedist, promoted development of this unit and assumed initial responsibility for its medical direction. Dr. Babcock since has joined the staff of the Caylor-Nickel Clinic in Bluffton and Dr. Richard E. Lindseth, associate professor of orthopedics, is now acting medical director.

To provide the most comprehensive care to the patient and his family, a multidisciplinary team (including physician, nurse, physical therapist, occupational therapist, social worker, recreational therapist, dietitian, chaplain, and vocational rehabilitation counselor) was established.

The main goal of the rehabilitation team is to facilitate the return of the patient to his family and community realizing his fullest potential for independence. To be accepted into the rehabilitation program, the patient and his family must be willing to accept the responsibility for learning and giving care. The degree of achievement, depends to a great extent on the motivation of the individual and his family. For this reason, the patient and his family should be actively involved in planning, learning, and administering care.

To provide for continuity of care, discharge summaries from each dicipline are forwarded to the family physican. In addition, a rehabilitation out-patient clinic is available for periodic patient re-evaluation.
