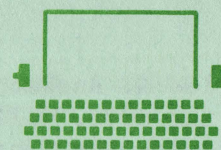


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IUPUI STARTS PROGRAMS FOR YOUNG STUDENTS

Gifted and talented students entering grades five through nine next fall are enrolled in the Young Scholars Program at IUPUI this summer. A development of the IUPUI Honors Program, directed by Dr. Miriam Z. Langsam, the Young Scholars Program includes innovative courses such as well-being versus viruses, orderly chaos-creative problem solving, better-think and inventions.

Logo computer language will be taught and students will work in television and science laboratories and have daily exercise and play in the I.U. Natatorium/Track and Field Stadium. The first session concludes today (July 10) and the second and last session begins Tuesday and ends July 24. Dr. Langsam, also acting associate dean of the School of Liberal Arts at IUPUI, says that she and the staff are excited about the opportunity to teach "these special people." "IUPUI is assuming a responsibility to nurture the talents of the gifted and creative," she says. "There is no reason for waiting until they reach college age." Enrollments are limited to 150 students, and they are on campus daily from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

In the meantime, a new weekend German language school for children from pre-school through the eighth grade scheduled to begin this fall is being organized by the Department of German Language and Literature with support from the Indianapolis German-American community, businesses with international clientele, the Indianapolis Public Schools and the Indiana chapter of the American Association of Teachers of German.

Giles Hoyt, associate professor of German at IUPUI and chairman of the advisory board for the project, says the German school is an attempt to solve the problem of mediocrity in education by attacking the roots of the problem. Dr. Hoyt says, "Language deficiency in students is only part of the bigger problem that is hurting modern education in the United States. It is all part of a general lack of structure and discipline in education..."

Dr. Harry Reichelt, German department chairman, is director of the project. He says the program is the only one of its kind in Indiana.

A LITTLE SPLASH MUSIC, PLEASE

The grace and beauty of synchronized swimming will fill the I.U. Natatorium this month as two spectacular events, "A Classical Splash" and the 1983 Junior National Championships, arrive on campus.

"A Classical Splash" is a unique performance with the United States team performing an exhibition of synchronized swimming to the accompaniment of the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra. Fine arts, sports and Indianapolis enthusiasts will witness this event in the setting of the natatorium Friday at 8 p.m. Tickets (priced at \$7.50, \$12.50 and \$25) are available at the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra box office, the Indianapolis City Center and selected American Fletcher National Bank offices.

Charles A. Ansbacher, one of the most successful conductors to combine sports and the arts, will be the guest conductor for "A Classical Splash." Consistent with the image this event commands, "A Classical Splash" corporate sponsors are Elizabeth Arden and AFNB.

The dynamic combination of the newest Olympic sport and the ISO in a spectacular pool setting recreates the aura of Esther Williams' MGM extravaganzas. Synchronized swimming has evolved from those MGM days into a highly technical, athletic sport.

"A Classical Splash" is a fund-raising and publicity event for Synchronized Swimming. All proceeds go toward the U.S. Synchronized Swimming Team. The team will remain in Indianapolis following the "Splash" to host clinics throughout the city.

U.S. Synchronized Swimming recently relocated its headquarters from Colorado Springs' Olympic Headquarters to Indianapolis. Judy McGowan, president of U.S. Synchronized Swimming, says, "Indianapolis is an ideal location for our sport because of its strong community support for amateur sports, facilities like the natatorium, and genuine support from the private sector such as that shown by Lilly Endowment, Elizabeth Arden, and AFNB. We are grateful for the opportunity presented to us by Lilly Endowment and look forward to becoming a vital part of a vital city."

The national all-star line-up will be seen a week later at the 1983 Junior National Championship, sponsored by Eli Lilly & Co. and AFNB, also at the natatorium, July 20-24. PARKING RATES INCREASED

Parking rates have been increased as of July 1, and the designation system for parking lots has been changed from Blue, Green, and Red to "A," "B," and "E." Signs designating lot use will be changed this summer to conform with the plan, which includes parking reciprocity between all I.U. campuses.

Rate for an "A" parking permit will be \$9.50 per month, a "B" permit will be \$4.40 per month, and Evening permits will be \$1.50 per month. An "A" Garage Card will be \$15.40 per month, and a "B" Garage Card will be \$14.85 per month. Parking meters will accept nickels, dimes, and quarters. Rates will be 7½ minutes for 5 cents, 15 minutes for 10 cents, and one hour for 40 cents.
