

ASHE JOINS SPORTS SCHOLARS FOR CONFERENCE

World tennis champ Arthur Ashe Jr. will join international sports scholars Harry Edwards and Richard Lapchick for an unusual conference, "Sports and Leisure in Culture," March 5-7 at the Hilton on the Circle Hotel. Sponsored by the Afro-American Studies Program and the Center for American Studies on campus, the conference will focus on sport from the humanities and cultural perspective. Ashe, who is about to publish another book, will discuss the little known facts about the role of African-Americans in sports. Edwards, who is IUPUI's 1987 Addison Lock Roache Lecturer, is a professor of sociology at the U. of California, Berkeley, and author of several books. Once a star college athlete, he will present the address, "Issues in Modern Collegiate Athletics: Social and Cultural Roots of a Burgeoning Institutional Tragedy." Edwards is concerned about education policies that cause athletes to be treated as "bodies without minds." Lapchick is director of the Center for the Study of Sport in Society at Northeastern U. and will present, "Sport and South Africa: The Initial Round of Attack." He has also written many books. Former ballerina Anya Peterson Royce, whose back injury led her to become professor of anthropology and dean of faculties at IUB, will also speak, as will a dozen other scholars from universities and colleges from across the country. Women in sports, sports and cartoons, sports as culture, Jesse Owen and Joe Louis are among the subjects. Fees for the conference are \$5 for students and older people, \$25 for others. IU PIONEERS HELP DISCOVER ALZHEIMER'S LOCATION

Dr. P. Michael Conneally and **Dr. Jonathan Haines** from the School of Medicine are among the researchers whose breakthrough findings indicate that the gene for familial Alzheimer's disease (FAD) is on human chromosome 21. The researchers isolated three fragments of DNA that proved to be closely situated to the FAD gene. They found that whenever the defect causing FAD was inherited, so were these other pieces of DNA, called markers. This information prompts the international team to predict a quick isolation of the exact gene responsible for the disease, which is usually associated with aging. Once researchers identify the exact gene, how it functions and malfunctions, a treatment for the disease that causes dementia and death within five to 10 years from onset, can be expected. The research to locate the gene on the DNA involved huge families of more than 100 people, in some cases, who are from Massachusetts, Nova Scotia, Germany and Italy. The Italian family, in which some members get Alzheimer's around the age of 40, were particularly helpful in the study, researchers said. The complicated, but interesting findings of the research teams from IU, Harvard U., Massachusetts General Hospital and the National Institutes of Health were published in the Feb. 20 issue of the journal Science.

DEAN CARTER NOTES IMMIGRATION LAW CHANGES

The new Immigration and Naturalization Service law changes regulations on the hiring of non-immigrant foreign people. (Non-immigrants are people who are in the U.S. on visas and who do not intend to, or cannot, stay for long periods.) Fines of up to \$5,000 can be imposed for inappropriate hiring of non-immigrants. The International Student Services Office is the only official IUPUI office that prepares documents and signs requests for visas for employment, visiting scholars, researchers, faculty, and sponsorship of permanent residents. This includes all F, J, and H visas. Anyone on campus who intends to arrange for non-immigrants to work, teach or study here should contact Burdellis L. PUERTO RICAN SCHOLAR LECTURES FRIDAY

Guillermo A. Baralt-Paz, University of Puerto Rico, will present a free public movie and lecture about the bomba, folklore music of Puerto Rico, on Feb. 27, 10:30 a.m., CA 438. Bomba was developed on the island by African slaves to secretly communicate plans for rebellions and conspiracies against their Spanish masters at the turn of the 19th Century. CHEMISTRY GETS RARE CHROMPRES 25

Chrompres 25, overpressured layer chromatography (OPLC) equipment, has been acquired by the Chemistry Dept. in the School of Science, making IUPUI one of only four facilities in the U.S. equipped with OPLC instrumentation. Invented in Hungary in 1977, OPLC is also referred to as forced flow thin lay chromatography. The equipment is used by graduate students under the direction of David Nurok, associate professor of chemistry. It uses a technique to separate mixtures containing compounds of academic, medical and industrial significance. It was manufactured in Hungary, marketed by the British firm, Newman-Howells Associates Ltd., and purchased with funds provided by Eli Lilly & Co. and Lilly Industrial Coatings.-SAR

PROF. JEGEN'S TAX TIPS: HOLD OFF ON W-4

You can go ahead and fill out that awful new W-4 form that determines your withholdings this year, or you can wait. Prof. Jegen is fairly sure that there will be a new W-4 form that may be easier to understand. Even so, he suspects that in some cases even the new form will cause more to be withheld than is necessary. Nothing is lost if you already filled out the form; you can change it anytime.

On the subject of deductions for employee business and miscellaneous expenses, there are now "severe limitations" on what you can deduct. One example: All IUPUI employees who want to claim business expenses not reimbursed by the university, can do so only if the expenses total 2 percent of their adjusted gross income, so it makes good sense to keep good records and ask the university to reimburse expenses that qualify. Expenses incurred in moving are not subject to the 2 percent rule, but can be used only if the taxpayer itemizes.... (Lawrence A. 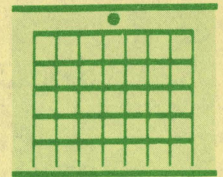
