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# UNITED WAY CAMPAIGN IN HIGH GEAR

Along with the tennis complex, the physical education/natatorium building and playing fields and stadium promise a bright athletic future for Indianapolis and the university.

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### SLIDE SHOW: LECTURE SET AT HERRON

A symposium by noted archeologist Nunzio Daniele entitled "Paestum: Origins and Historical Evolution," will be presented at <u>2 p.m. Friday, Nov. 6</u> in the auditorium of the Herron School of Art. <u>At 8 p.m. that day</u> 11 Herron students will give a special slide presentation, HERRON "ITALIA '81," an outgrowth of an IUPUI Honors course that included a six-week trip to Italy. A. Ian Fraser, Herron assistant professor and coordinator of the art history program, guided the class through Rome, Naples, Florence, Venice and Ravenna.

The Herron group met Daniele at the Greek ruins at Paestum, near Naples, where he had worked extensively. Fraser invited him to speak at Herron and view the students' show. Both programs are open to the public at no charge.

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### SCHOOL OF SOCIAL WORK RECEIVES GRANTS

More than \$316,000 in federal grants have been awarded to the I.U. School of Social Work at IUPUI, according to Dean Leonard Schneiderman.

A grant from the National Institute of Mental Health is being used to form a new mental health unit at 520 East 12th Street to service racial and ethnic minorities and underserved rural populations in Indiana. It is staffed by faculty members and graduate students of the school.

The needs of dependent and neglected children and their families in situations of emergency separation are the focus of a grant from the Office of Human Development Services of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Faculty members and students of the school will work in the Marion County Children's Guardian Home on a demonstration project in family and child welfare. The project includes a cooperative arrangement between the school and Family Services of Indianapolis in offering special training to students preparing for a career in these fields.
