Nalin to serve as interim EAD for educational affairs

Peter Nalin, MD, associate professor of clinical family medicine, has been named interim executive associate dean for educational affairs while a search is conducted for a successor to Stephen Leapman, MD, who is retiring at the end of June.

Dr. Nalin currently serves as associate dean for graduate medical education at IUSM. He also directed the Family Practice Residency at IU. Previously, he was a founding faculty member of the Lafayette (NY) Family Medicine Residency Program and served as its director for more than four years. In 1998, he completed the fellowship of the National Institute for Program Director Development.

Since 2000, Dr. Nalin has earned recognition as a fellow of the American Academy of Family Physicians. He was elected to the board of directors of the Association of Family Medicine Residency Directors in 2002. In 2005, he earned the bronze level Program Director Recognition Award from AFMRD.

In 2001, Dr. Leapman became the school's first executive associate dean for educational affairs, making him responsible for the creation, coordination and implementation of all major education programs. A surgeon by training, Dr. Leapman is the Delores and John Read Professor of Medical Education and as chair of the school's admission committee, he also holds the Frank C. and Ruby L. Moore and George T. Lukemeyer Professorship. He joined the IUSM faculty in 1977.

Wells Center interns arrive

Twenty-nine students arrived this week at the Herman B Wells Center for Pediatric Research to complete a 10-week summer internship with pediatric researchers. More than 250 applicants applied for the limited positions; most of the candidates come from Indiana universities.

Each intern consults with a faculty mentor to define the research project. Students are strongly encouraged to attend a number of seminars and research-related laboratory and Wells Center meetings as part of the work experience. They are required to make a presentation at the completion of the internship and participate in a round table discussion with Wells Center faculties.

The program is open to high school seniors, who are 18 years of age or older, and undergraduate and graduate students. Each student receives a stipend of \$2,500. Interns are responsible for their own housing and transportation. Weinian Shou, PhD, associate professor of pediatrics and Wells researcher, is the program's director.

This week on Sound Medicine

Tune in at 2 p.m. Sunday, June 7, or 8 p.m. Tuesday, June 9, to *Sound Medicine*, the award-winning weekly radio program co-produced by IUSM and WFYI Public Radio (90.1 FM) in Indianapolis. The program is hosted by Barb Lewis.

This week, Wesley Burks, MD, chief of pediatric allergy and immunology at Duke University Medical Center, will discuss his research into finding a way to reduce the number of peanut allergies in children. Ultimately, he hopes his research leads to a cure.

Nick Grahame, PhD, associate professor of psychology at Indiana University-Purdue University Indianapolis, will explain his research on impulsivity and alcoholism which focuses on whether alcoholism causes impulsivity or if impulsivity causes alcoholism.
