TUPUT JOINS RANKS OF COLLECTATE LICENSE PLATES

W ant to show your love of IUPUI and support university scholarships at the same time? Here's your chance: sign up for a 1993 IUPUI license plate by Aug. 31. The plates, part of Indiana's collegiate series, will look like the plate at right and will feature the campuscape in maroon on a white background with a maroon border. The letters "IP" and numbers will be in black. The plates will



cost \$35 more than the normal excise charge for next year's "Amber Waves of Grain" state plate. The scholarship fund will receive \$25 of that fee; the contribution is deductible. IUPUI plates can be purchased for cars, recreational vehicles and trucks under 11,000 pounds. There must be 200 orders in the Community Relations office (AO 109) by Aug. 31 or they won't be available. Plates can be reserved by using the form below or the full forms available at the Community Relations office. Checks for \$25 should be made payable to IU Foundation/IUPUI Plate. The IUPUI plate replaces the normal state plate purchased at your normal time in 1993; those who don't yet have your 1992 plate must still purchase that plate as usual. The \$25 reservation fee is due with the application; the remaining \$10 is a branch fee to be paid when the plate is picked up or through the mail. For more call 4-2134.




