FOUST TO HEAD SEARCH AND SCREEN COMMITTEES FOR IUPUI CHANCELLORSHIP

Indiana University President John W. Ryan has named a broadly representative Search Committee to nominate candidates to succeed Dr. Maynard K. Hine as chancellor of IUPUI. Dr. Hine announced recently he will relinquish the chancellorship next July 1.

Cleon H. Foust, dean of the Indianapolis Law School, was chosen as chairman of both the Search Committee and a smaller Screen Committee that will make final recommendations to President Ryan.

LEGISLATIVE REPORTS VI

House -- New Bills

- HB 1330 (Bauer) -- Would appropriate \$150,000 to provide financial assistance to family physicians studying osteopathy; recipients of grants would be required to practice 15 months in Indiana for each one-year grant. Assigned to Public Health Committee.
- HB 1337 (Nelson) -- Would provide for representative of higher education institutions that are not state-supported in state's telecommunications system. Assigned to Public Policy Committee.
- HB 1375 (F. Coleman) -- Would eliminate smallpox immunization requirements for school children. Assigned to Public Health committee.
- HB 1387 (King) -- Would authorize establishment of state system of community colleges. Assigned to Education committee.
- HB 1393 (Lamkin) -- Would prohibit and set penalties for the sale of college term papers. Assigned to Education committee.
- HB 1418 (Mullendore, Latz) -- Would levy 2 per cent sales tax on sporting event tickets.

 Assigned to Ways & Means committee.
- HB 1427 (Crowe) -- Would repeal previous authorizations for capital improvements and land acquisitions by state universities. Assigned to Education committee.
- HB 1435 (King) -- Would eliminate requirement that foreign medical graduates complete two years of hospital postgraduate training as a condition for Indiana licensure. Assigned to Public Health committee.
- HB 1438 (Bainbridge) -- Would require hospitals and nursing homes to give patients itemized medical statements including dosage, brand names, and cost of drugs. Assigned to Public Health committee.
- HB 1507 (Mahoney, Jones) -- Would establish a state university in Lake County using present I.U. and Purdue properties. Assigned to Education committee.
- HB 1508 (Jones) -- Would establish a state university in Marion County. Assigned to Education committee.
- HB 1509 (Mullendore) -- Would require public announcement of amounts of state scholarships and educational grants. Assigned to Education committee.

Senate -- New Bills

- SB 253 (Bosma) -- Would provide public financial assistance to persons suffering from catastrophic illness. Assigned to Public Health committee.
- SB 278 (Kelley) -- Would establish a University of Northern Indiana in South Bend. Assigned to Education committee.
- SB 365 (Bosma) -- Would extend medical assistance program to persons suffering from catastrophic illness when uninsured medical expenses exceed \$6,000. Assigned to Public Health committee.
- SB 370 (Borst) -- Would create a State University of Indianapolis. Assigned to Education committee.
- SB 382 (McCormick) -- Would levy a 2 per cent sales tax on tickets to sporting events. Assigned to Finance Committee.

PARKING PROBLEMS

Chancellor Maynard K. Hine called a meeting last Wednesday of representatives from the Veterans Administration Hospital, LaRue Carter Hospital, State Board of Health, Marion County General Hospital, Riley Board of Governors and IUPUI, to discuss methods of easing the critical parking problems on this campus. Two subcommittees were recommended -- one to study parking problems on the west side of the campus and the other around Riley Hospital and the proposed Regenstrief Health Center.

It was agreed that the only solution to our parking problem is the construction of two or perhaps three high-rise parking garages. It is also probable that there will have to be a redistribution of assigned parking areas so that patients coming into the area will have first priority and visiting physicians second.

Any suggestions which might improve parking on this campus would be welcomed by the chancellor.

RYAN NAMES COMMITTEE TO FIND SUCCESSOR TO DEAN FOUST

I.U. President John W. Ryan has appointed a 20-member committee to find a successor for the retiring dean of the Indianapolis Law School, Cleon H. Foust. A former Indiana strorney general, Dean Foust will retire on June 30 as dean of Indiana's largest law school, but he will continue as a professor of law.

Chancellor Maynard K. Hine said the committee has been carefully selected to represent the state's legal profession and judicial system as well as the school's students, alumni and faculty. "The school's importance to the practice of law in Indiana is so substantial that we need an outstanding committee to find an outstanding dean," he said.

In appointing the committee, Dr. Ryan said, "The dean of law in Indianapolis is one of the university's most important positions. The committee will have an important job in discovering a new dean who can continue the progress which has been achieved under Dean Foust."

Indianapolis law professor R. Bruce Townsend will head the committee which includes representatives of the school's faculty and its students, alumni, and prominent members of the Indiana legal profession.

Among the members are United States District Court Judge William Steckler, Warrick Circuit Court Judge Addison Beavers, and Indianapolis attorneys Douglas Church, John T. Dillon, C. Ben Dutton, John M. Holt, William F. LeMond, Ted B. Lewis, and Ben J. Weaver.

Dean Foust has continued an Indianapolis Law School tradition which has closely aligned the school, its faculty, students, and graduates with the practice of law and public service in Indiana.

The Townsend committee has been instructed by President Ryan to conduct a national search for a successor to Dean Foust, interview the leading candidates, and to present its recommendations in April. Nominations and recommendations are invited from readers of the Green Sheet.

Department of The Thaw: Editors in the News Bureau received word from Peking last week that the Chinese Medical Association is resuming publication of its journal and asked to be continued on the list to receive publications of the I.U. School of Medicine. The librarian of the Chinese Medical Association sent a copy of No. 1 of the Chinese Medical Journal (all in Chinese characters) with the note saying, "We are very grateful that you have been sending us regularly your publications since China's Medicine suspended its publication in 1969 due to Struggle, Criticism and Transformation Movement."

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
