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## I.U. IS NATION'S 10TH LARGEST UNIVERSITY

Indiana University is the 10th largest university in the United States with 70,286 full-time and part-time students. Purdue University ranks 21st.

In his annual national survey for the American College Testing Program, Dr. Garland G. Parker, vice-provost for admissions and records at the University of Cincinnati, reported I.U. 14th on the basis of full-time enrollment only (42,336). Purdue's 28,023 full-time students placed it 22nd on this comparison.

Grand total enrollment in the 1,456 schools which reported in the survey, released last month, was 6,647,567, an increase of 3.5 per cent over last year.

The most dramatic national change, Parker said, was the increase in the numbers of women and freshmen. Nearly 3 million women were counted on the reporting campuses for a 6 per cent increase. Although more men were counted, they increased their numbers by only 1.6 per cent.

Freshmen registered an increase of 4.6 per cent after three years of decline.

Parker noted that women will provide much of the enrollment impetus in the future. The increase of full-time women students was 4.1 per cent, compared to the men's 0.3 per cent increase. The most dramatic increases were counted in law, medicine and allied health; technological, business and related fields, and theological schools. In every category, women led enrollments of part-time students.

While they represent 44.8 per cent of the total enrollment, women make up 43.3 per cent of the full-time enrollees and 48.4 per cent of the part-time enrollees, according to Parker's reports.

HAVE DEGREE, WILL WORK

R. Ray Hawkins, director of the Office of Career Counseling and Placement, reports that a record number of students filed credentials with his office last semester. At mid-year, more than 950 candidates registered to interview with 72 agencies, firms and hospitals who visited the campus to recruit IUPUI students.

The demand for candidates in technical disciplines, coupled with a continual shortage of accountants, dominated the recruiting activity. Hawkins says that many graduates will find a competitive job market this year, reflecting an economy in the doldrums.

Hawkins reports that orientation meetings will be held next month to acquaint students with the job market. Also, more than 40 government agencies will be represented on the campus Feb. 19 to acquaint students with governmental careers.

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## ATTENTION: PERF PERSONS

# Here are the basics of the PERF supplemental annuity option:

- 1. PERF members can supplement their retirement annuity with tax-deferred contributions from their salaries.
- 2. There is a maximum amount each employee can contribute according to the Internal Revenue Code.
- 3. The tax-deferred annuities can take two forms:
  - a. Non-cashable, meaning the money cannot become spendable income until actual retirement.
  - b. Cashable, meaning the money could become spendable income before retirement if the employee so desired.
