nformation Online (IO), IU's automatic library information system, will be available at all libraries on the IUPUI campus beginning ▲ Jan. 30. To celebrate, a reception is planned for 10 a.m. that day in the first floor reference area of University Library. All "info-maniacs" welcome. IO provides access to the collections of the entire university through terminals in the libraries and from office and home computers. It provides traditional access to library materials by author, title and subject and also opens new doors by adding the power and flexibility of keyword searching. Staff members in each library have information about the system and its services. Also available to all faculty and staff is a "Quick Start Guide," a single sheet providing guidance on the use of the online catalog. Librarians on each campus can be contacted about in-class demonstrations of the system. The implementation of IO has been made possible by funding from the state of Indiana and the Lilly Endowment. It is a link in a statewide automated network that eventually will include Ball State, Indiana State, Notre Dame, Purdue, Vincennes and the University of Southern Indiana.

"CHALLENGER SCHOLARS" NAMED

Two IUPUI elementary education majors have been named recipients of the 1990 Challenger Scholar Award, named for the seven astronauts who perished four years ago today (Jan. 28). Greer Leisz, a junior who also received the award last year, and Penny Michelle Wright, also a junior, were selected for their scholarship and their interest in teaching the sciences, engineering and technology and the humanities. The students received the awards Jan. 24 from William M. Plater, executive vice chancellor and dean of the faculties.

Beginning with the 1991-92 academic year, a Ronald McNair Scholarship also will be offered, named after one of the seven astronauts on the Challenger. Funded by an anonymous donor, the award will encourage minority students to pursue careers in teaching the physical and social sciences.

Leisz, a graduate of Bloomington North High School, has maintained a 3.69 GPA and in the last year has worked at the Children's Museum Space Quest Exhibit and its Water Clock Festival. She also was a counselor for IUPUI's Young Scholars Program and represents the School of Education in Student Government. Wright, who lives in Thorntown with her husband Rick and two daughters, has been active in her church, Brownie and Girl Scout activities and as a "jacqueline of all trades" for Thorntown Little League. The 3.79 GPA student also works as a library assistant at the Curriculum Resource Center at IUPUI.

HUNDREDS COME TO LEARN ABOUT COCHLEAR IMPLANT PROGRAM

More than 300 ear specialists, speech-language pathologists, deaf-oral educators, audiologists and parents were on campus Friday and Saturday for a National Institutes of Health-funded conference on the children's cochlear program presented by the IU School of Medicine, Dept. of Otolaryngology, Head and Neck Surgery. This is one of two programs in the country currently funded for research on cochlear implants in children by the National Institute on Deafness and Other Communication Disorders, NIH. Director of the program, held at University Place Conference Center, was Dr. Richard T. Miyamoto, professor and chairman of otolaryngology, head and neck surgery. His research program on cochlear implants was among those begun in the early 1980s and some 40 children have undergone the simple operation here and received extensive training to use the implant. Other noteworthy participants at the conference were Dr. William F. House, the inventor of the cochlear implant, and Dr. Ralph Naunton, director of programs funded by the National Institute on Deafness and Other Communication Disorders.
