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

Taylor designs costumes

by Laura A. Burria Brenda Taylor has 10 years of design experience as the costumer and is a founder of the Buck Creek Players. In addition. she is a theatre major at IUPUI.

She added University Theatre to her schedule, which often includes 12-14 hour days, a year

She has designed and built costumes for productions such as, "Nightwatch", "Man-in-the-Moon Marigolds", "Hasty Heart", "Barefoot in the Park", and for children's theatre, "Land of the Dragon".

She began planning the design of the costumes for Sleeping Beauty in April and after spending up to 40 hours per costume all will have to be

complete by June 17.

The 40-hour per costume total includes much more than cutting and sewing.

Taylor and Dotti Peek, her assistant, and various other part-time helpers must research the period of the play for authenticity. Then sketches and color drawings must be prepared. Keeping in mind each

costume's coordination with the other costumes, Taylor shops for every yard of fabric, and all linings, trims, thread, zippers and each button and

snap.
"Before any of the on-hands work even begins, we have to read the script three times to become completely familiar with

each character," states Taylor. "Each costume must create an appropriate impression of the character and we have to be familiar enough with what each does so that, for example, a pocket is available in the scene where a character is required to put something in his pocket," she adds

The Sleeping Beauty costumes are of heavy brocades and extensive 1500's detail. She explains that consideration of the frequent pecessity for quick change must be built into the

"The queen, for example, has one change which must take place in 45 seconds. Her dress looks like one dress, but a part of it can be quickly removed

backstage, enabling her to reappear, '15 years later', in another dress," Taylor explains

According to Taylor, after a thorough study, they meet with the director to get her impressions and ideas about each character before actual construction can begin.

Taylor has received six awards from Encore, a nonprofit theatre group, for her work during her years at Buck

She received awards for her costuming in "The Boyfriend". Royal Family" and Seventeen" and for set design in "Dark at the Top of the Stairs" and "Arsenic and Old

'The Sleeping Beauty' to be performed by University Theatre

by Laura A. Burris A dramatization of the fairy tale, "The Sleeping Beauty". will be performed by the University Theatre of IUPUI three times per day at the Children's Museum June 23-27.

University Theatre is the first educational theatre group to be invited to perform at the Children's Museum, Previously only professional, often "bigname" companies have performed during the Summe Performing Arts Series.

Dr. Dorothy Webb, the director of the play, is an Indiana Arts Commission Award recipient and in addition has received a sizable grant from the museum to produce this children's fantasy.

She said she considered and discarded "Beauty and the Beast" as too frightening for children. She considered others and decided on "The Sleeping Beauty", a gentler fairy tale familiar to everyone.

The script she chose was written by Charlotte B. Chorpenning, who Dr. Webb says is considered the 'grandmother of children's theatre"

This version includes the usual king, queen, prince, princess, and attendants but also includes five fairies.

Una, Cordia, Belita and Freenia are the good fairies and Frytania is the insulted fairy who gets her revenge by placing a curse of death on the princess.

Dr. Webb commented that this play contrasts with the current practice of actively Beauty" involving young audiences with the dialogue and action, or "participation drama". All of the action and dialogue in this play is among the actors and

She studied theatre formally at Southern Illinois University earning her undergraduate and master's degree and received her doctorate degree from IU-

The performance will be on a circular stage, with the seating rising from the level of the stage. People seated high above the stage would only see tops of heads if the actors and actresses do not face upward slightly as they speak and gesture. become their character

Because the rehearsal area is a large room, she watched periodically standing on a chair or ladder to get a more accurate

The cast will be able to rehearse three or four times on the formal stage before the first performance.

She begins the rehearsal session in the second-floor gym—the rehearsal room at the Marott Building at 902 North Meridian-with vocal and physical exercises to promote relaxation and concentration. She urges each performer to carefully analyze and know the character portrayed. To make

They move on to community theatres such as Beef 'n Boarda. Christian Theological Seminary, Indiana Repertory Theatre, Broad Ripple Play House, Starlight Musicals or Civic Theatre.
Her detailed comments to the

actors and actresses includes coaching of one character in his exact expression of youthful fear in a scene where it is revealed that he played a part in leaving Frytania out of the christening

During intense scenes, she also comments on the exact timing of the howling of the wind, the seconds between sentences and, in certain parts the rhythm of a sentence. Each movement, gesture, word and sound is considered and

In addition to authentic characterization, Dr. Webb insists that each performer also learn other apsects of production. Everyone helps build sets and costumes. Two members of the company carefully follow the script during rehearsals, providing

cues when necessary.
The cast, made up mostly of theatre majors, are experienced in a variety of other productions. Dr. Webb say they are receptive to the attention given to detail and are engrossed in the demands of intensive four nights per week rehearsal

The honor of being chosen adds an extra inspiration and keeps them all preparing

thoroughly.
The production opens June 23 at the Children's Museum, 3000 N. Meridian with three shows daily thru June 27. Admission is

'San Fransico'...An album of acoustic guitars

For those who love acoustic guitar, an exciting new album featuring perhaps the three greatest jazz guitartists of the past decade has just been released.

"Friday Night in San Francisco", is a must for both jazz and guitar enthusiasts alike.

During the summer of 1980, three superstars of the jazz guitar—John McLaughlin, Al Di Meola, and Paco DeLucia—teamed up into what is now referred to as an acoustic supertrio.

England's John McLaughlin is probably the most diverse member of the trio.

Having been shadowed under the wing of the Miles Davis Band in the late '60's, in the early seventies McLaughlin did some exploring on his own forming such groups as the "One Truth Band", "Shakti", and the highly acclaimed "Mahavishnu Orchestra".

Al Di Meola, a native of New Jersey, launched his musical career at age 19 when he replaced Bill Conners as the guitarist for Chick Corea's "Return To Forever".

After recording three albums with Corea, he began recording solo albums with the most famous being "Elegant Gypsy", "Casino", "Land of the Midnight Sun", and "Splendido Hotel".

Guitarist Paco DeLucia was born in southern Spain. He is labeled as a flamenco guitartist.

Paco released his first solo album at the tender age of 16 and has won both European and world wide acclaim.

Side one begins with
"Mediterranean Sundance"
performed by Al Di Meola and
Paco DeLucia and composed by
Al Di Meola.

Energy is the best word to describe this cut. The spanish ferver that intensifies in the studio version, explodes in the live cut as the lightning-fast fingers of both artists bolt at incredible speeds.

incredible speeds.
Chick Corea's "Short Tales of
the Black Forest", with Al Di
Meola and John McLaughlin,
winds up the first side in a
guitar duel with the audience
acting as judge.

John and Al begin by delicately rendering the Corea selection. Upon the urging of the audience, however, the two begin flirting for the attention of the crowd. Al begins the flirtation with Mancinni's "Theme from the Pink Panther". John follows with some boogie-woogie rock & roll.

Paco DeLucia's "Frevo Rasgado" is the first selection on side two. Playing with John, the two embark on a very traditional flamenco style with Paco playing the very brash and heavy bass chords and John accenting with the very light and delicate highs.

The second composition on the second side features all three

players. Di Meola's "Fantasia Suite" is a very happy and harmonic piece. On this cut each artist performs a short solo and returns to the cheerful chorus.

The last selection on the album is unique in that it was done in the studio. "Guardian Angel", composed by John McLaughlin, seems to echo his earlier influence with the Mahavishnu Orchestra. John's followers will recognize his unmistakable style in this cut.

The acoustic supertrio album,
"Friday Night in San
Francisco", rates four stars. The
only flaw of the album relates
to the fact that the technical
expertise was somewhat
sacrificed for the spirit and
excitement of a live
performance.

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
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
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
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
