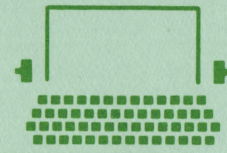

TRUSTEES OKAY CHANGES, DELETIONS, ADDITIONS

Next spring the ground will break near University Hospital and building will proceed on our \$34.1 million Clinical Research Building that got the nod recently from the IU trustees. In other matters, the trustees set in motion Union Building projects that include a \$27,500 renovation that will change the first floor lounge into administrative offices, and another \$265,000 project to give us table service dining and a private dining room area in the Hoosier Room. Also approved was the \$50,000 Phase III addition to the Science/Engineering and Technology Building, and a \$3.4 million dollar expansion of our central chilled water system, which will cool University Hospital, the new Clinical Research Building and Riley. A land-lease agreement on the project called the Northwest Redevelopment Project Area-Lockefield Gardens, which will permit 300 privately developed apartment units to be built, was also approved.

People were also on the agenda. Trustee-approved changes include: Robert E. Martin, former bursar, has a title change from associate director of Administrative Affairs to acting director of that office. Angela McBride, professor of nursing, adjunct professor of psychology and psychiatry has the additional appointment as associate dean for research, development and resources, School of Nursing. Finally, Margaret M. Pike received an appointment as associate professor of nursing, with tenure, and assistant dean for administration, School of Nursing.

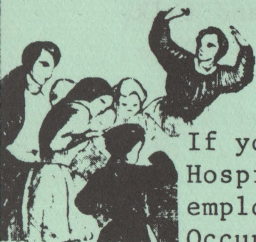
