Nurses' Day July 3

SPERLING MEMORIAL HONORS RILEY NURSES



To honor the memory of Anne E. Sperling, R.N., and all nurses and others who have cared for the children at Riley Hospital, a sculpture by Hoosier artist George Debikey will be dedicated in ceremonies in the hospital atrium July 3 at 3:15 p.m. All are welcome. Adding to the celebration of nurses is Mayor William Hudnut's official proclamation making July 3 Riley Hospital Nurse's Day in Indianapolis. Before her untimely death in an auto accident in 1984, Sperling was a "superb nurse and a wonderful human being who was totally dedicated to her work with young children in the toddler unit," said Morris Green, M.D., former physician—in—chief at Riley, who was intrumental in the project

TRIBUTE to commission "just the right memorial." The search took months, but finally the sculptor and Dr. Green met through Sharon Schlosser and Ondine Terrebonne, Indianapolis art consultants, and along with Omer Foust, director of the Riley Memorial Association, the memorial resulted. Debikey's 20 by 20 inch sculpture depicts a nurse comforting an infant. It was rendered not as a likeness of Sperling, but to epitomize all nurses and care givers of sick children. The sculpture is made possible by gifts from Sperling's family and friends to the Riley Memorial Association, and it will be permanently installed atop a 4-foot oak base on a portal wall in the atrium at Riley.

10 a.m. to 4 p.m. for three Saturdays in July, beginning July 7. At



SPFA'S ROSENIRUAB RESEARCHES ALL-AMERICAN SUMMER "RITUAL"

Small American cities that want to be called home to the boys of summer may be in a no-win game because even minor league teams can become big boys with expensive toys that cities cannot afford, writes Mark S. Rosentraub, professor and associate dean in the School of Public and Environmental Affairs. His research and resulting paper entitled, "Just Say No?: The Economic and Political Realities of a Small City's Investment in Minor League Baseball" was presented recently at the 20th annual meeting of the Urban Affairs Association in Charlotte, N.C. Using Fort Wayne as a model, and using standards that can be applied to many Midwestern cities, his research shows that Fort Wayne was entirely correct economically in saying no to the owners of the Timbers minor league team who wanted to relocate the Class A team and wanted the city to finance a stadium for it. His research shows that little new money would be generated in the area, but it also concedes that "sports alone offer the best escapism for the masses and provide good publicity for a city. Fans may be acting out an ancient human ritual of building arenas and stadia to watch and honor their heroes." His research was assisted by doctoral student David S. Harlow.


