



NEW REGISTRAR ARRIVES IN TIME FOR RECORD ENROLLMENT



Mark Grove, newly appointed IUPUI registrar, considers himself a hybrid—"well-suited to IUPUI—a hybrid university and with a hybrid student body." No stranger to registration challenges, the 36-year-old Notre Dame graduate was registrar at Central Connecticut State University and also at IU South Bend. Only arriving in Indianapolis Aug. 13, but familiar with the IU registration computer system, Grove weathered with a smile the record-breaking fall enrollment of approximately 27,500 students, a 3.8 percent increase over 1989. "Life gets just a little murky as we count student populations this close to drop-add, but we know we have a record enrollment and that many students enrolling for the last time

CROVE record enrollment and that many students enrolling for the last time through the Access Center have been deferred until next term. (The functions of the Access Center are now included in the operations of the Undergraduate Education Center in the Union Building.) Regarding the future of registration at IUPUI, Grove looks forward to helping implement IU CARE, the Course Analysis/Record Evaluation computer program that matches transcripts with school catalogs for a more accurate and more easily designed registration. "Other Big Ten schools are using CARE successfully and I expect it to make things at IUPUI easier for students, faculty, counselors—and me," he said.


