Brater extends service to university as IUSM dean

IUPUI Chancellor Charles R. Bantz announced Thursday that IUSM Dean Craig Brater, MD, has agreed to continue serving the university as dean of the IU School of Medicine beyond his originally planned retirement date of November 2010.

"Since 2000, Craig Brater has served as our dean of medicine with great distinction and with great leadership," saidChancellor Bantz. "My thanks to Craig for his continued commitment to the School of Medicine, IUPUI, Indiana University, and the health of Indiana."

In consultation with President McRobbie and Dean Brater, Dr. Bantz has established a timeline for identifying a successor. Ideally, a successor will joining the school in the third quarter of 2011, he said.

First Mamlin Professor of Medicine

William M. Tierney, MD, has been recommended to be named the first Joseph J. Mamlin Professor of Medicine pending approval by the IU trustees.

Dr. Tierney is a Chancellor's Professor of Medicine, director of the Division of General Internal Medicine and Geriatrics at IU and a senior research scientist at Regenstrief Institute. He graduated from the IU School of Medicine in 1976, completed his residency at IU, and joined the faculty in 1980.

The Joseph J. Mamlin Professorship was established in 2001 by the Health and Hospital Corporation of Marion County in honor of Dr. Mamlin, who retired in 1999 as medical director at Wishard Memorial Hospital and the IU School of Medicine after more than 30 years of service. The intent of the professorship is that it be held by an IUSM faculty member who serves as chief of general internal medicine at Wishard Hospital.

Bloomington Hospital joins Clarian Health

Clarian Health continues to expand its services with the integration of Bloomington Hospital into its statewide system. The hospital has campuses in Bloomington and Orange County. The integration was completed Jan. 1 after two years of planning and discussion.

The integration became official Jan. 1, following approval by Bloomington Hospital's and Clarian's boards of directors. The announcement, made Thursday, is an initial step to aligning facilities and resources to better support the needs of the patients in south central Indiana and develop a seamless continuum of care.

The Clarian Health integration includes Bloomington Hospital, Bloomington Hospital of Orange County and Bedford Regional Medical Center.

Young Investigator Awards in Clinical-Translational Research

The Indiana Clinical and Translational Sciences Institute (CTSI) is seeking applicants for special research fellowships in clinical-translational research. Clinical research includes epidemiological studies, clinical trials, or other investigations involving human subjects. Translational research consists of either "T1 research" (interface of basic science to human studies) or "T2 research" (interface of human studies to the community).

To be eligible, candidates must be:

- Clinician-scientists with a doctoral degree (physicians, nurses, dentists, pharmacists, clinical psychologists, optometrists, veterinarians, allied health care professionals, etc.).
- US citizens or permanent residents
- Full-time junior faculty or research scientists who would be eligible to apply as principal investigator on an NIH grant or career development award but who have not to date been a principal investigator on an R01 or equivalent grant.
- Able to identify co-mentors who are faculty investigators from at least two different disciplines (preferably a clinician and a nonclinician-scientist).
- Planning to submit a grant for external funding (either a career development award or independent research grant) during the first 12 months of the award.

Postdoctoral clinical or research fellows are not eligible to apply unless their institution has arranged for them to have a full-time faculty or research scientist appointment by summer 2010.

Benefits include partial salary support as well as tuition and fees for required and elective coursework, pilot research monies, and travel funds to attend the national CTSI young investigator meeting.

Applications must be submitted by **Monday, Feb. 8**, and awards will begin July 1.

After closing out a successful and productive year in 2009, the Indiana Clinic looks forward to continuing to add physician practices and specialty groups in 2010. Within two years, the Indiana Clinic expects to be the largest multi-specialty physician group in Indiana.

Indiana Clinic to launch web site

The Indiana Clinic is creating a Web site to explain the clinic's purpose and how the organization works. Indiana Clinic growth

As of Dec. 20, 2009, approximately 375 physicians and 550 staff had joined the Indiana Clinic. Some of the larger physician practice groups include Methodist Medical Group, Respiratory and Critical Care Consultants (RCCC), Emergency Medicine (EMGI), University Clinical Neurologists, Inc. and Clarian Arthritis Care Centers, as well as other Clarian-employed physician groups representing diabetes and endocrinology, geriatrics and psychiatry. Newly recruited physicians in cardiology, general surgery, orthopedics and pediatric otolaryngology also have joined, along with Clarian-employed staff from Clarian Cardiovascular Surgeons and Methodist Cardiology Physicians.

Avatar training supports patient-centered care

To reinforce the organization's service commitments of communication, quality and professionalism, the Indiana Clinic has focused on "Our Vision of Service Excellence," a highly interactive online training module for staff and physicians, and its new AVATAR patient satisfaction database. AVATAR tracks how

physicians and staff are doing relative to patient care and quality. Among the information provided, patients also can add comments about their experiences. Results are available to all providers, offering transparency that will encourage an even higher level of performance.

News to Use

Visa processing lengthened with recent changes

A recent change in H-1B visa processing is anticipated to significantly lengthen the process of obtaining H-1B status for international employees, according to the IUPUI Office of International Affairs.

Mary Upton, assistant director for scholar services, suggests H-1B petition requests be submitted to her office as early as possible. Previously, prevailing wage determination from the U.S. Department of Labor was provided by fax through an Indiana agency. That agency previously provided these determinations for Indiana employers, usually within 1-2 weeks. As of Jan. 1, this process became centralized in Washington, D.C., and now requires hard copy request through U.S. Postal Service.

It is anticipated the change will extend the process by 2 to 4 weeks. This change is in addition to the longer Labor Condition Application process initiated July 1, 2009. Based on these changes, the IUPUIO Office of International Affairs is recommending that, whenever possible, departments prepare the H-1B request form six months before the required start date if you would like to avoid the additional \$1,000 expense of premium processing. It is becoming impossible to prepare and receive a decision on an H-1B petition (even using premium processing), in less than 3 months.

Phone numbers to change at IUH and Riley

Indiana University and Riley hospitals are changing to a new phone system beginning next week. The conversion will provide users with leading-edge communication technology while significantly reducing Clarian's phone system costs.

The new main number for IU and Riley hospitals will be 944-5000; individual and departmental phone numbers' prefixes will change as well. Numbers that currently have 274 prefixes will change to 944; those with 278 prefixes will change to 948. The last four digits of the phone numbers will remain the same.

The old telephones will be collected over a two-week period after the switch. Please leave the old phones connected and in their original location so the telephone equipment can be collected, inventoried and returned to UITS, unless other arrangements have been made with your manager. Equipment that is removed and cannot be located for return will be charged to the office's cost center.

cannot accompany the spouse, the clinic requests the spouse to bring the student/employee's IUPUI ID and an official photo ID for the person receiving the vaccine. The vaccine is not available for the children of employees or students.
