

LEHNEN AND MCCARTHY LEAD NEW IU CENTER

Research supported by a new center with sites at IUPUI and IUB will seek to discover what makes good schools and successful students. Robert G. Lehnen, professor of public and environmental affairs at IUPUI, and Martha M. McCarthy, professor of education at IUB, will direct the newly formed Indiana Education Policy Center which is made possible by a \$2.3 million grant from Lilly Endowment. To begin, the Center will examine the amounts of money allotted schools, types of management, curriculum, the education of teachers and the way teachers teach. The restructuring of schools and the way children learn also will be investigated. McCarthy will oversee operations at Bloomington, where she directs the Consortium on Education Policy Studies. Lehnen will direct the IUPUI site, where he directed a School Finance Project in SPEA. They are developing a data base that will be used by legislators, educators and others in establishing education policy in the future. The resources and specialists in more than 18 schools in the IU system will also be utilized and, according to Lehnen, "The Center can have a profound effect on education reforms, decision making and planning." McCarthy said that while the Center will operate objectively and in a nonpartisan way, "I would like to see the Center take a leadership role in shaping the education agenda in Indiana."

SWISS PIANIST DOBLER FIRST IN CONCERT SERIES— Acclaimed Swiss pianist Charles Dobler will present a free concert of traditional and contemporary music Oct. 21 at 4 p.m. in the auditorium of University Place. The animal rights movement and its relationship to medical research and education is the topic of a symposium entitled "Animal Liberation: Its Relationship to Medical Research and Education," Oct. 16, 8-10 a.m., in the auditorium of Emerson Hall. It will feature panel presentations by professionals with long-standing interests or involvement in the use of animals for research and teaching.
