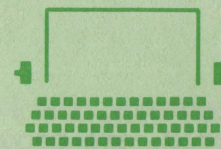

LILLY EXECUTIVE TO BECOME NEW DEAN OF ENGINEERING, TECHNOLOGY

Eli Lilly and Co. executive Alfred Potvin has been chosen to become the new dean of the Purdue School of Engineering and Technology by the IU trustees and Purdue University officials. Potvin, an expert in engineering and medical devices, will assume his responsibilities July 1, replacing retiring Dean Bruce Renda. The former Lilly executive has strong ties to the business and industry community, and also is well-known in academic circles through his work as founding chair and professor of biomedical engineering and professor of electrical engineering at the University of Texas at Arlington.

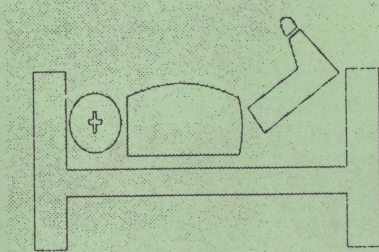
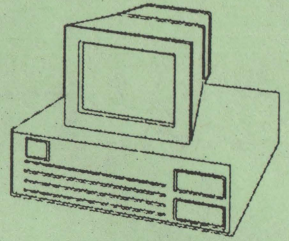

ROUND TABLE FORMED TO STRENGTHEN TIES WITH ALUMNI, COMMUNITY

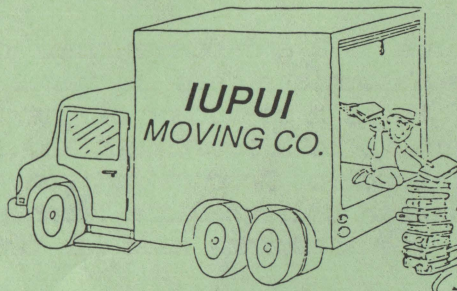

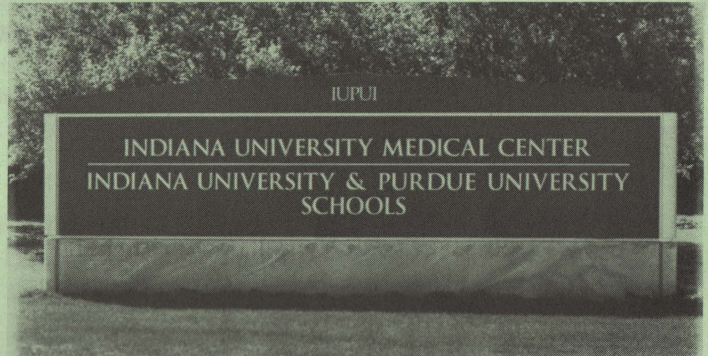

ACCOUNTING CHAIR TO HEAD INDIANAPOLIS BUSINESS PROGRAMS

John Helmkamp, a School of Business faculty member since 1973 and former chair of the accounting department, has been chosen as the new associate dean in charge of the school's Indianapolis programs as of July 1. He is a co-author of the "Managerial Accounting" textbook and has been a consultant to both government and private industry. Helmkamp was the Alva L. Prickett Professor of Accounting from 1984-86 and was the recipient of the 1993 Schuyler F. Otteson Undergraduate Teaching Excellence Award. NEW SIGNS EXTEND HELPING HAND TO VISITORS, CAMPUS RETURNEES

When they return to IUPUI to help celebrate the university's 25th anniversary, visitors, graduates and former employees are likely to notice a new look to the campus. An extraordinary number of changes have taken place, ranging from the new Science, Engineering and Technology complex to the soon-to-open IUPUI Library to the expansion and numerous changes at the IU Medical Center.



To help refresh the memories of returnees and assist visitors, IUPUI has installed 42 new signs with directions and building identifications throughout the campus. Among them are four portal signs at the major entrances to the campus, including the corners of Michigan and West streets, New York and Limestone streets, University Boulevard and 10th Street, and Elmwood and 10th streets. The portal signs include the IUPUI name at the top and list the Indiana University Medical Center and Indiana University and Purdue University schools below.

STATE'S ROLE IN HEALTH-CARE INDUSTRY TO BE DISCUSSED

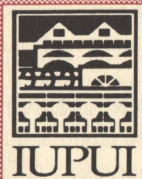
Does Indiana have a future as a center for economic development in the field of health care? A team of key figures throughout the state has been studying that notion, and will present its findings June 14 at the University Place Conference Center and Hotel from 10 a.m. to noon. The study team includes such diverse figures as Indiana Gov. Evan Bayh, Indianapolis Mayor Steve Goldsmith, IUPUI Chancellor Gerald L. Bepko, IU President Thomas Ehrlich, Purdue University President Steven Beering and IU School of Medicine Dean Walter Daly.

The findings are likely to focus on the state's relative strengths and weaknesses as a base for growing health-care businesses and industries. Research included discussions with experts in the field and trips to other states that have had success in the field. Once the findings have been presented, those attending the session will discuss the merits of Indiana pursuing a developmental effort, and how to proceed if the state shows promise as a leading site for commercial and research interests in the field.

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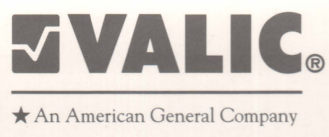
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
