HERRON STUDENT SHOW OPENS FRIDAY

The "1979 Student Show" -- a wide variety of works in a broad range of studies from the freshmen, sophomores and juniors at the Herron School of Art -- opens Friday at 7 p.m. with a public reception in the gallery at the school.

Represented in the first three years of the students' arts experience at Herron is the Freshman Foundation Program, a carefully coordinated year of diversified study which serves as a base for all future work. Paintings, prints, drawings, sculpture, woodworkings, ceramics, photography and graphic design represent the second and third year students. These works exhibit the sophomore and junior artists' and designers' aesthetic considerations and technical abilities in their particular major.

"1979 Student Show," which runs through April 6, approaches the traditional and non-traditional processes centering toward Herron's bachelor of fine arts degree. Did You Notice -- Dr. Irwin, in a letter to The Indianapolis News on February 22, heartily endorsed the development of a multi-purpose park along White River.
