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HEALTH WORKERS COMPLETE IUPUI COURSE

Twenty health center workers received certificates of completion from IUPUI Friday for their participation in a four-week Workshop for Health Advocates. They were honored at an informal luncheon in the Union Building.

According to Alvin S. Bynum, assistant dean of the Downtown Campus and co-ordinator of the workshop, the course was presented by IUPUI faculty and staff for health workers who are assigned to the Central, Martindale and Southeast Health Centers.

The major concern was to help them become more personalized in patient and potential patient care. They discussed topics like basic communication skills, history of minorities in the city, legal aspects of medical services, family and social problems and interviewing techniques.

Dean Bynum said the workshop, the third such one offered by IUPUI, was developed in response to requests from health center administrators who thought their employees would benefit from such training. A grant from Methodist Hospital assisted in sponsoring in the workshop.

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LIBRARY EXHIBIT

A collection of pharmacopoeias and books on materia medica is currently on display in the School of Medicine Library. They cover the period from 1517 to 1893 and represent English, Continental, and American works of note.

The earliest work is a text by Hieronymus Brunschwig published in Germany. Also included is a copy of the first pharmacopoeia written and published in America by an American, William Brown, in 1778. It was written for the guidance of medical officers in the Continental Army during a time when medicines were often in short supply and had to be made up under field conditions.

The books in this exhibit are from the Lilly Library in Bloomington.
