

CONTINUING STUDIES ONGOING WINNER

Remember that little packet of flower seeds that came last year along with an invitation to "keep growing" with Continuing Studies? Well, from that idea sprouted a nice laurel. The IUPUI Division of Continuing Studies Marketing Office, directed by **Harriett Bennett**, was recently picked from 400 entries to win the Marketing and Promotion Award from the National University of Continuing Education Association (NUCEA). The same award was harvested last year.

Also during the NUCEA meeting early this month in Kansas City, **Patricia Boer**, director, Office of Women's Research and Resources, and **Frances Dodson Rhome**, director, Humanities Institute, accepted the Creative Programming Award for the retreat series, "Women Forming Partnerships in Power and Progress." The award went officially to the Continuing Education Center for Women, which after the series joined the Women's Studies Program to form the IUPUI Office of Women's Research & Resources.

GRAPES OF WRATH MAY BE ON THE TABLE

Cesar Chavez, founder and president of the United Farm Workers Union, will speak Apr. 29, 7 p.m., Union Building first floor. Maintaining that more than 300,000 farm workers are poisoned by toxic pesticides used in the growing of the table grapes Americans eat, Chavez will talk about the use of pesticides, the poisoning of workers, food boycotts, the rights of migrant farm workers and other issues. There is no charge for the open discussion. His visit is sponsored by the Metropolitan Indianapolis Campus Ministry and the Dept. of Anthropology. Chavez's ties with IUPUI are strong because over the past 10 years four major research reports on farm worker conditions and public support for healthy, fair working conditions for the workers have been done by Kenneth Barger, professor of anthropology, who works closely with Chavez and farm workers. Barger thinks that there are too few controls on the use of pesticides in food growing and that exposure to pesticides can cause birth defects, cancer, chronic illness and death among farm workers and their children.-JG


