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ITEMS: OFF-CAMPUS LIVING TO "THE DEVIL MADE THEM DO IT"

More college students have found homes away from campus, according to a Census Bureau report. While the number of students living in college dormitories has remained near 1.8 million for the period from 1966 to 1971, the number of students living on their own has increased from 1.4 million to 2.4 million. College enrollment increased from 6.1 million to 8.1 million during the same period. The proportion of college students living in institutional housing has, given the growth of the college population as a whole, declined from 29 per cent to 23 per cent. . . John D. Rockefeller IV, who failed in his bid to become governor of West Virginia, will become president of West Virginia Wesleyan College in March. . . A legislative committee writing a master plan for education in California has recommended zero population growth for state-financed education, suggesting that colleges and universities halt the expansion of faculties and facilities. They have also suggested a "College of California" to be run by professionals recruited from outside the academy. . . Fordham is offering a course in "devilology" which will deal with demons, witchcraft, demonic possession and devil worship. How was it received? According to the National Catholic Reporter, it was filled half an hour after the opening of registration. (From University Today Newsletter)

GROUP STUDYING GRANT PROGRAM

Dr. John C. Buhner, vice-chancellor and dean of the faculties, has announced the appointment of an ad hoc planning group to consider ways that IUPUI might respond to opportunities available in the grant program of the Indiana Committee for the Humanities. Some \$150,000 is available for the entire state for the fiscal year 1972-73 and a number of grants already have been made.

Chairman of the local planning group is Dr. Patrick McGeever, assistant professor of political science. Members are Dr. Miriam Langsam, Dr. Edmond Byrne, Dr. Lauranne Sams, Kwame Mumina, Dr. M. E. Robertson and Mrs. Joyce Williams. Dr. Buhner emphasized, however, that proposals to the Indiana Committee for the Humanities are not limited to university sources. Any group may make a proposal for funding whether it's associated with the university directly, peripherally, or not at all.

"Government and the Family" is the theme for which proposals will be considered. The aim of the project is to bring to bear upon public policy issues the value systems traditionally identified by academic humanists and to show how these values might be used by family members to consider their relationship to ongoing or proposed governmental policies. The planning group is seeking ideas from the entire university community and any suggestions, ideas or proposals should be given to Dr. McGeever, Ext. 8342.

FORMER LAW SCHOOL DEAN DIES

Funeral services for Benjamin F. Small, first dean of the Indianapolis Law School, were held Friday in Flanner and Buchanan Broad Ripple Mortuary, with burial following in Crown Hill Cemetery. Mr. Small died Tuesday in a Bethesda, Md., hospital.
