SYMPOSIUM PRECEDES 'A RAISIN IN THE SUN'

Tony Award-winning producer and playwright Robert Nemiroff will lead a symposium Feb. 22, the opening day of "A Raisin in the Sun," being produced by University Theater at IUPUI. The symposium will focus on the works of the playwright, Lorraine Hansberry, the first black woman to produce a play for Broadway. Productions are also set for Feb. 23 and March 1-2. Director is Prof. J. Edgar Webb.

The symposium begins at 2 p.m. in the Madame Walker Urban Life Center, with papers being presented by two scholars on black art and history, Dr. Margaret B. Wilkerson associate professor, Dept. of Afro-American Studies, U. of California at Berkeley and Dr. Robert Grant, associate professor of English, University of Southern California. At 3 p.m., Nemiroff, Hansberry's literary executor, will lead an open discussion and response session. He shared a working relationship with Hansberry from the time of their marriage in 1953. Since her death in 1965 he has adapted and published her works. A reception is at 5 p.m. The symposium is free and open to everyone. The play opens at 8 p.m. Tickets are \$2.50 for students and senior citizens, \$3.50 for faculty and staff, and \$5 for others. For tickets, call Ext. 2094.


