# Did you know that...

IUPUI's spring semester enrollment has hit a grand total of 19,961, five short of last spring's enrollment of 19,966. I.U. East (Richmond) was the only campus in the system to register an increase, up 166 students to an enrollment of 1,379. System-wide, the spring enrollment is 71,121, down 1,669 for a 2.29 percent decrease compared to last spring's figures.

## AEROBIC DANCING?

"Fundamentals of Magic," "Earthworm Farming," "Aerobic Dancing," "Greek and Roman Mythology," "Getting That First Job" and "Managing the Unsatisfactory Employee" are among 65 new non-credit courses for spring scheduled by the Continuing Studies Divison of IUPUI.

Other new classes include "Cartooning," "Home Maintenance--Electrical and Non-Electrical," "Financing a College Education," "Russian People and Politics," the "American Value System," "Introduction to Spelunking," "Home Movie Making," "Business Economics," and "If Life Begins at 40--What's Next?"

Almost 200 non-credit courses for adults on a wide variety of subjects are offered, most of them beginning the first week in March. "Keeping up with requests for new subjects is a big part of our job," says Marjorie L. Stonehill, assistant dean of the division.

"This year we have <u>expanded our business course offerings</u>, as well as adding some <u>25 new personal interest courses</u>. Meanwhile, the old favorites keep filling up each semester.

"More than 12,000 adults attended our classes last year," she added. Classes will be held at two IUPUI campuses, as well as at Carmel and Warren Central high schools, plus several private locations.

Registration for continuing studies courses is being held this month at the Continuing Studies Office, 1201 East 38th Street. You may enroll by mail or telephone at Ext. 4501. Free schedules are available by calling Ext. 4501.

The length of classes may vary from one-day workshops to 16-week classes. Most are six- to eight-week courses and fees vary according to class expense. (N.B. For most continuing studies courses, IUPUI faculty and staff are entitled to a one-third fee waiver. Inquire when registering.)

Canadian Sunset -- Frederick W. Kleinhans, associate professor of physics, and about 30 students and amateur astronomers will head to Winnipeg, Manitoba, to see the eclipse of the sun on February 26. The eclipse can be viewed in totality in some portions of the continent, but only partially in Indiana. Kleinhans' record on eclipse viewing is 50-50: He was rained out in New England in 1958 but was successful in Canada in 1963.
