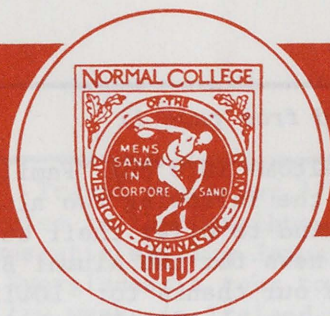

EMMA SOLLIBERGER JOHNSON, '18, was recently recognized by the JOURNAL OF HEALTH, PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND RECREATION as one of 26 members of AAHPER Association who have been members for 50 years or more.

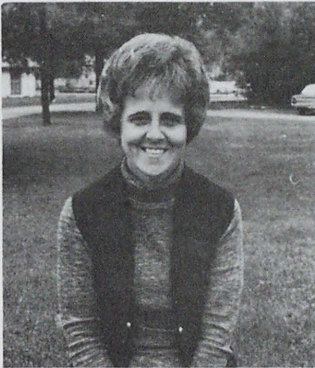
Mrs. Johnson retired 15 years ago from her position as girls physical education director at the Illinois School for the Deaf, Jacksonville, where she had taught since 1919. Under her guidance, the Illinois School for the Deaf developed a girls athletic program unequalled in other American schools for the deaf.

Mrs. Johnson's greatest satisfaction and fame came from the pageants she presented. She sponsored 37 indoor and outdoor programs and pageants. In 1939, for the School's centennial, she presented "The Deaf Through the Ages" to an audience of 5,000 people.

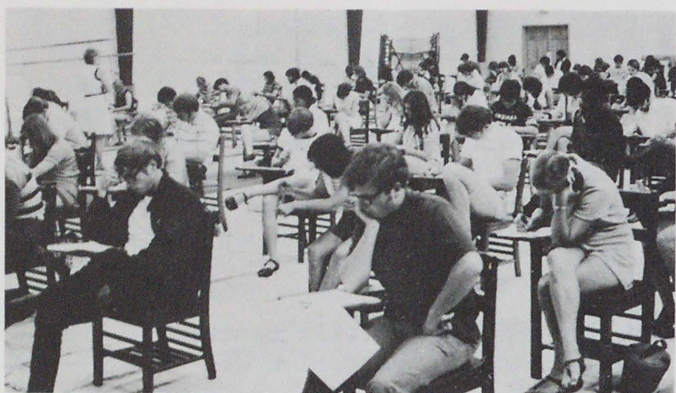

Louis Kittlaus Retires



Louis Kittlaus, who graduated from the Normal College in 1928, retired October 6, 1972, as Director of Physical Education and Athletics for the St. Louis Public Schools after 43 years in the profession.

Lou possessed the unusual ability and insight for good organization. When he assumed his position as director of the St. Louis Schools he inherited a curriculum that emphasized a formal exercise program. Recognizing the need for a well balanced physical education program, he gradually introduced the following activities: games, sports, dances, and playdays. This balanced curriculum set the pace for many other communities.

Louis Kittlaus started his great career in the St. Louis Elementary Schools in 1929, then taught in the high schools and coached track and field and football for 13 years. He conducted 70 summer playground programs. He was also chairman of the Department of Physical Education for the St. Louis School System's Harris Teachers College.

Lou received his B.S. degree from the Normal College in 1928 and had the honor of participating that year in the Cologne Turnfest in Germany. He secured his M.S. degree from Indiana University in 1935.

At the National AAHPER Convention, March 1972, in Houston, Texas, Louis Kittlaus was the recipient of the National Honor Award. He has been a member of the National Association for 30 years, vice-president and president of the Missouri AHPER and vice-president (physical education) and convention manager several times of the Central District AHPER.

Louis Kittlaus and his wife, Pauline, are looking forward to attending the German Turnfest in Stuttgart, June 9-17 and a three week visit to Austria and Switzer-

land. Following their return to the States they plan to visit their sons and daughter in Pasadena, Chicago, and Indianapolis. It was introduced by ANDY LASCARI '21, instructor at the Buffalo Turners from 1923 to 1958. We believe that probably ANDY was the originator, possibly with the collaboration of some of his cronies of college days at Turner College in Indianapolis. We wrote to ANDY asking him about the origin of the Turner Applause and his reply was, 'Perhaps you are right for naming me as the originator of the Turner Applause - at least until someone can prove different'. ANDY says that he can't remember how it came about or where he got the idea. He contacted some of the old Turners of the classes at his Sacramento Turners but they could not help him. He wrote to some of his college classmates but got no information.

Your editor (this refers to Ray Ping) was a classmate of Andy's at the Turner Normal College 1921-1923. We, along with several Turner men at the College formed a club, which was forerunner of the present-day Stein Club. Many a Kommers (beer party) was promoted by this group and many, run by the local Turners, were attended. At these parties (illegal during prohibition) many innovations in entertainment were introduced, such as how to hold the beer mug while drinking, how to replace it on the table, how to give a toast (sung or spoken), how to address the Kommers Leiter (beer Party leader), and other ridiculous, but funny and entertaining oddities. If the number was good and was accepted, (er hat gut gemacht) the performer received applause. We believe it was at these affairs that the Turner Applause was originated and developed. It was probably part of the protocol of the Kommers. Nothing was done at these parties in an ordinary or conventional way, so why not the applause in this unique way? He did a good job, so let's give him the Turner Applause."

Congratulations to you Ray, on a concise, intelligent, researched, and comprehensive piece of writing. We all learned something from it. Wotta ya say gang? How about a nice round of Turner Applause for the greatest Kommers Leiter of them all, namely, Raymond G. Ping. Whipple Relates

"Total Push Technique"

MARTHA WHIPPLE, director of the YWCA Health and Physical Education Department of Anderson, Indiana, has introduced her pre-school swimming class, ages three to five, to the new "Total Push Technique" developed by Dr. B. W. Gabrielson of the University of Georgia. This technique speeds the process of learning by getting the youngsters accustomed to the water by overcoming their fears through firm persuasion.

The course covers a period of ten consecutive days, and upon completion many of the children are ready for more advanced skills. Parents who have enrolled their children in this class are requested to attend a compulsory meeting to make sure they understand the program, how they

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can help their children attain success, and the importance of attending every session.

Martha has indicated that this course is not for all children, particularly those who may be extremely nervous.

However, a great many who complete the program are capable of swimming 25 feet or more, dive off the edge of the pool, and jump off the diving board and swim to the side of the pool.

It should be indicated that this technique stresses breath control and ducking the head under the water to get the children to feel at "home" in the water. Once this has been accomplished the youngsters learn to relax and coordinate. This, in turn, speeds the process of learning.
