BEPRO TO OFFICIALLY OPEN NEW BIO LAB

Researchers from four IUPUI schools will be involved in a new Biomechanics and Biomaterials Research Laboratory at IUPUI, the first of its kind in the nation. Chancellor Gerald L. Bepko will officially open the new lab Nov. 19, with a reception from 6-8 p.m. and dedication ceremonies at 6:30 p.m., second floor of the School of Dentistry. The unique research team based in the center will include representatives from the Schools of Engineering and Technology, Dentistry, Medicine and Science. Among the equipment that will aid in research is the facility's centerpiece, a \$250,000 Material Testing System (MTS), which applies mechanical engineering concepts to the study of bone structure in medical and orthodonture research. It allows the research team to study the manner in which bone, ligaments and joints respond to mechanical forces. The MTS is devoted to research on smaller, more delicate bones, while another MTS in the SET II Building is calibrated for larger bones and other engineering projects. Research in the lab is expected to benefit people with such conditions as cranial/facial abnormalities, and to prevent fracture, sports injury and other problems. —R. Burrous

Margaret began breathing, was checked by Campus Fire Protection Services and IFD Rescue folks and was found to be okay. So okay was she that she resumed her duties that day. She joined Vice Chancellor Robert E. Martin, Director of Campus Facility Services Emily C. Wren and others in a special ceremony for Hadnott.


FINALLY...
