IUPUI TO GET AFFIRMATIVE ACTION OFFICE

Chancellor Maynard K. Hine has announced that, to implement at IUPUI the provisions and requirements of national and state legislation and administrative orders, as well as all-Indiana University policies with respect to all aspects of civil rights, equal employment opportunity, and non-discriminatory practices, an affirmative action office will be established soon at IUPUI.

Releasing guidelines for the position of affirmative action officer and a job description for the holder of that office, Chancellor Hine announced that he hoped to be able to appoint an acting affirmative action officer by December 1, 1972. Since the guidelines call for an extensive search and screen operation, he said that it might be at least July 1, 1973, before a permanent appointment can be announced.

The Chancellor said that anyone interested in being considered for appointment as acting affirmative action officer, or interested in nominating someone for that office, should do so in writing to Vice-Chancellor John C. Buhner, who is serving as chairman of IUPUI Affirmative Action Planning Committee. The planning committee will serve as a screening group for the acting appointment. Its members, in addition to Dr. Buhner, are Dean Doris Merritt, Dean William Nevill, Professor James White, Mr. Thomas Duane, Mr. William Spencer, and Professor Frances Rhome, ex officio. To expedite the process of naming an acting officer, the committee has requested that nominations reach Dr. Buhner's office no later than Wednesday, November 15, 1972.

Metros Coach George Dickison has scheduled some heavy competition for the Metros. There are two games scheduled with Southern Illinois-Edwardsville, which opens its schedule this year at Wisconsin and is on Purdue's schedule next year.

Several of the I.U. and Purdue regional campuses scheduled for the Metros this year have been well established in the NCAA and have been playing against strong small colleges for the last several years.

EXPERTS TO DEBATE MIDEAST PROBLEMS TUESDAY

A pair of opposing authorities on international law will debate Middle Eastern issues at 8 p.m. Tuesday in Room 101 of the Lecture Hall. The legal authorities will debate the proposition that "International Law Is Useless in Resolving the Mideast Dispute."

Agreeing with the proposition will be M. Cherif Bassiouni, associate professor of law at the DePaul University College of Law, Chicago. Born and educated in Egypt, Bassiouni is a graduate of the Cairo University School of Law and the Indianapolis Law School. He is the author of a recent book, Storm Over the Arab World.

Arguing for international law will be Joel J. Sprayregen of Chicago, general counsel of the Illinois Division of the American Civil Liberties Union. The Yale Law School graduate has travelled extensively in the Middle East and has recently had an article published in Christian Century, "The New Serfdom in the U.S.S.R.; a Visit with the Jews of Audacity." Active in many American Jewish organizations, Sprayregen has travelled in the Soviet Union and Israel to talk with leaders of the Jewish movement.

Sponsored by the Chancellor's Convocation Committee, the free debate is open to the public.

NEW IUPUI REGISTRAR

Neil E. Lantz, who was appointed by the board of trustees at its October 27 meeting, begins his duties Monday (November 13) as IUPUI registrar and director of records. He comes to IUPUI from the I.U. and Purdue Fort Wayne Campus where he has been director of admissions and records. For four years before that, he was registrar and director of records and admissions for the IU campus at Fort Wayne.

He replaces John G. Williams Jr. who resigned in August to return to full-time teaching in the Department of Computer Technology. Lantz will be headquartered at the 38th Street Campus and in charge of registration and records of the 13,000 undergraduates at IUPUI. He co-ordinates registration for the schools of medicine and dentistry through Virgil Hunt, a member of his staff.

FACULTY SURVEY IN PROGRESS

In compliance with requirements of the Federal government, a survey of all faculty, full and part-time, is under way at IUPUI. Questionnaires have been mailed to compile information about institutional practices in hiring, contractual salaries, promotions, merit increases, research grants, committee appointments and class assignments.

In devising the questionnaires, the IUPUI Commission on the Status of Women closely followed those Federal guidelines directly relating to sexual discrimination and each question pertains to a specific regulation. Questionnaires should be answered as quickly, accurately and completely as possible and returned to Dr. Robert Long, Department of Psychology. Results will be computerized and summaries should be available before the Indiana General Assembly assembles in January.

From the study, disparities which may exist in either male or female faculty contracts will be reflected; those areas requiring immediate correction will be noted. The completed survey will furnish information necessary for formulation of an Affirmative Action Program.
