

Indiana--the University and the State--is one of only five places in the USA that have garnered multi-million dollar grants for research "that may will turn health care on its head," said Deborah Freund, professor in the School of Public and Environment Affairs who is principal investigator for the project. President Thomas Ehrlich and Chancellor Gerald Bepko announced this week that IU has received a \$5 million grant for a five-year study of outcomes in total knee replacement. The U.S. Dept. of Health and Human Services also awarded similar grants to Harvard University for coronary artery disease, Dartmouth College for prostate disease, Johns Hopkins University for cataract surgery and the University of Washington (Seattle) for back pain. Research at all the sites is expected to set national standards for treatment, particularly among the aged, and result in different and more informed relationships between doctors and patients. Researchers will weigh medical, social and psychological benefits, along with risks and associated costs. Under Freund's leadership, the grant will be undertaken cooperatively by the SPEA, and the School of Medicine, through the Regenstrief Institute for Health Care. Working closely with her will be co-principal investigator Robert S. Dittus, M.D., associate professor of medicine, who will guide the medical research that will take place in Regenstrief, the Divisions of Internal Medicine and Rheumatology, and the Departments of Medicine, Family Medicine and Orthopaedic Surgery, all at the Medical Center at IUPUI. In announcing the grant, President Ehrlich said the University and the state can be very proud of IU's success in competing with other top universities in the nation, and in the resources that make it possible. Chancellor Bepko pointed out that the cooperation between two nationally schools--SPEA and Medicine--is a unique opportunity that will profoundly affect medical care for years to come.
