

A few facts to consider, if you haven't yet contributed:

The IUPUI United Fund goal this year is \$42,300. A number of local United Fund agencies invest some of their budgets in programs at IUPUI. Out of each dollar contributed, 93 cents go directly to the agencies (a comparatively low cost for conducting the annual campaign). Finally, nearly 700,000 persons in the Indianapolis area received services from United Fund agencies last year.

"APPEALING" PROCEDURES

Procedures have been established for reviewing appeals concerning the salaries of individual faculty members affected by the wage-price freeze. Chancellor Hine has appointed a committee, which is considering such cases and making recommendations on the basis of guidelines issued by the Federal government and interpretations made by the University. An appeal, with documentation, moves through the dean of the faculty member's school to the Chancellor, who refers the appeal to the committee. Chairman of the Wage-Price Review and Appeals Committee is Dr. John C. Buhner, vice-chancellor and dean of the faculties. Two faculty members who have 10-month appointments are members of the committee. They are Professor Arthur H. Weber, Jr., of the Herron School of Art, and Professor James P. White of the Indianapolis Law School. Professor Weber was nominated through

the Faculty Affairs Committee of the IUPUI Faculty Council. Professor White is parliamentarian of the Faculty Council.

- 1 -- The Medical Center Administration Building has been renamed ALLIED HEALTH BUILDING;
- 2 -- The 38th Street 'Administration Building has been redesignated A BUILDING;
- 3 -- The Medical Center Service Building has been redesignated PHYSICAL PLANT BUILDING;
- 4 -- The 38th Street Service Building has been renamed FAIRFIELD BUILDING.

This is the first phase of a continuing program to develop a consistent and comprehensive series of building names and designations for the IUPUI campuses.
