Regenstrief, IU study: machine learning as good as humans' in cancer surveillance

Every state in the United States requires cancer cases to be reported to statewide cancer registries for disease tracking, identification of at-risk populations, and recognition of unusual trends or clusters. Typically, however, busy health care providers submit cancer reports to equally busy public health departments months into the course of a patient's treatment rather than at the time of initial diagnosis.

This information can be difficult for health officials to interpret, which can further delay health department action, when action is needed. The Regenstrief Institute and IU researchers have demonstrated that machine learning can greatly facilitate the process, by automatically and quickly extracting crucial meaning from plaintext, also known as free-text, pathology reports, and using them for decision-making.

"Towards Better Public Health Reporting Using Existing Off the Shelf Approaches: A Comparison of Alternative Cancer Detection Approaches Using Plaintext Medical Data and Non-dictionary Based Feature Selection" is published in the April 2016 issue of the Journal of Biomedical Informatics.

"We think that it's no longer necessary for humans to spend time reviewing text reports to determine if cancer is present or not," said study senior author Shaun Grannis, M.D., M.S., interim director of the Regenstrief Center of Biomedical Informatics and associate professor of family medicine, IU School of Medicine. "We have come to the point in time that technology can handle this. A human's time is better spent helping other humans by providing them with better clinical care."

The IU Simon Cancer Center is pleased to announce the availability of funds for new pilot projects to assist investigators holding the ranks of assistant professor, research assistant professor, or assistant scientist but without an active national competitive research grant (e.g, NIH, NSF, ACS). Part of the American Cancer Society Institutional Research Grant, these funds provide support for beginning investigators to initiate their independent research program.

Note: The ACS-IRG Pilot RFA has been recently revised to include eligibility for investigators with pilot projects anticipated to take one year to complete.

Technology Enhancement Awards to aid advancement of IUSM technologies

During the inaugural ceremony for the Indiana Center for Biomedical Innovation last month, Anantha Shekhar, M.D., Ph.D., executive associate dean for Research Affairs at IUSM and director of Indiana CTSI, announced the winners of the Technology Enhancement Awards, a grant program developed by the ICBI, Indiana CTSI, and IU School of Medicine's Industry Collaboration Portal to fill a critical gap in commercialization by supporting advanced early stage technologies from IUSM academic labs. The TEA awards support technologies that include highly promising therapeutics (small molecule or biologics), diagnostics, or biomedical devices to achieve commercial attractiveness.

The TEA proposals were reviewed by a team of eighteen ICBI advisory council members consisting of leaders and entrepreneurs in life sciences arena. The winners are:

- Milan Radovich, Ph.D., assistant professor of Surgery and Medical and Molecular Genetics, IU School of Medicine, for developing a precision medicine approach to personalized cancer treatment
- Jian-Ting Zhang, Ph.D., professor of Pharmacology and Toxicology, Andrew and Peggy Thomson Professor of Hematology/Oncology, IU School of Medicine, for developing novel inhibitors targeting

surviving stability for development of targeted anticancer therapeutics

• **Yvonne Lai, Ph.D.,** senior scientist of Psychological and Brain Sciences, Indiana University-Bloomington, for developing the first drug of its kind to block the target mechanism of PTSD in the brain without triggering others that cause crippling side effects

The TEA awardees will be funded at \$50,000 for 12 months through a milestone-based project management mechanism. In addition, advice and mentorship from ICBI advisory council members will be available for these investigators.

About the ICBI

The Indiana Center for Biomedical Innovation, a newly created center located at the IU Health Methodist Hospital Noyes Pavilion, provides a platform for academic entrepreneurs to translate their discoveries into commercial products for health care and ultimately, improved patient care. "ICBI is a unique place for entrepreneurial researchers to transform their ideas and discoveries into products," said Jaipal Singh, Ph.D., director of ICBI. 
Indy – Join the fun at Jagapalooza tomorrow
