

## GROVE, HODES "SHANGHAID" WITH 16 STUDENTS

**J**effrey W. Grove, acting dean of the School of Law; W. William Hodes, law professor, and 16 American law students looked forward to being "Shanghaied" as they arrived last week in China's largest city for a one-month study program that was arranged earlier by Vice President Gerald L. Bepko when he was dean at the school. The trip is a new venture between the law school and the East China Institute of Politics and Law in Shanghai, near the East China Sea. While Dean Grove is not expected to stay the entire time, the others will be there four weeks and will have as many as five lectures a day, six days a week. Two from our law school are among the students, and Indianapolis lawyer Larry A. Landis is also attending. Subjects to be covered include essentials of Chinese language and laws governing tax, marriage, criminal procedure, civil procedure and international economics. Visiting Chinese Scholar Wang Qun was here last year and helped arrange the program.

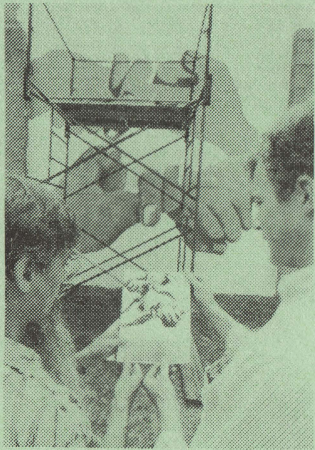

### CANCER RESEARCHERS FIND HOPE FOR MANY

Doctors at the medical center involved in research, studies and the treatment of several kinds of cancers affecting men and women are providing promise and hope for patients and families. Examples: **Dr. Stephen D. Williams**, professor of medicine, has discovered new, successful therapeutic agents in the treatment of later stages of testicular cancer. His study is published in the June 4 New England Journal of Medicine. **Dr. George Sledge**, assistant professor, presented findings significant in the treatment of metastatic breast cancer at a recent meeting of the American Society of Clinical Oncology. It involved a course of the drug, cisplatin, which when used before chemotherapy and as a first-line drug, resulted in significant tumor response (reduction) in nine of 20 patients studied. And, **Dr. Guido Tricot**, professor of medicine, reports in the May British Journal of Haematology, that a study he conducted in Belgium shows that a newly structured treatment program that uses long-accepted cancer fighting drugs has vastly improved the chances of survival for young adults who suffer from acute myeloid leukemia (AML). The new regimen extends life expectancy for those under 30 with AML.

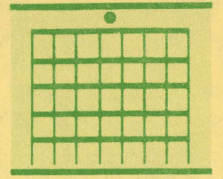
