MONEY NEWS

I.U. Vice-President Hartley has received a response to his request to the Cost of Living Council for a ruling on salary increases given to faculty members receiving promotions. We interpret this ruling to mean that individuals who received a "bona fide" promotion in faculty rank will receive salary raises accompanying promotions that were made prior to issuance of President Nixon's executive order of August 15. Therefore, unless the Cost of Living Council reverses this ruling later, faculty members who received promotions will receive their salary increases retroactive to August 15.

Since 59 per cent of IUPUI's faculty are 12-month appointees, this new ruling means that the salaries of the majority of IUPUI faculty will be unaffected by the freeze. We are continuing to seek methods of granting all increases in faculty salaries, while complying with the spirit of the wage-price freeze.

TECH PROGRAMS OK'D

A pair of IUPUI technology programs have been fully accredited by the national Engineers' Council for Professional Development. The accredited programs are in electrical engineering technology, a two-year program leading to an associate degree, and electrical technology, a four-year bachelor degree program. The accreditation is based on an evaluation of the quality of the curricula, the competence and achievement of the faculty, and the development and availability of facilities and libraries.

HERRON HEAD COUNT

Herron School of Art has reported a final enrollment figure of 404 students in the school's day and evening programs. The preliminary figures released by the University registrar were reported before enrollment was completed for Herron's Evening School.

There are 127 students in the evening program; 277 full-time, part-time and special students in the day program. Herron has also enrolled 160 junior and senior high school students in its Saturday school.

URGENT NOTICE TO ALL USERS OF GILFORD 103 DENSITOMETERS

Gilford Instrument Laboratories has advised the following:

It has come to our attention that the failure of a connection in the grounding system of the inter-connecting cable of our Model 103 (IR) Densitometer could cause an electrical potential to appear at the optical head of this instrument.

Out of 14 Model 103 units on our campus, 11 have been located and the necessary modifications have been made. However; there are three units not yet located. They are Serial Nos. 524, 525 and 177. 525 and 524 were purchased in 1962; 177 sometime prior to that, probably around 1959 or 1960.

Anyone knowing the location of these should notify Wayne M. Snyder, purchasing department at Ext. 7831. He has the modification kit available.

IMMORTALITY FOR CHEESE SAYERS

The News Bureau has established a working arrangement with one of Indianapolis' outstanding free-lance photographers, Ed Lacey. His services are available throughout the IUPUI system on these conditions:

1 -- If a request for his services is consistent with the public relations and publication programs of the News Bureau, the costs will be paid from the News Bureau budget.

2 -- If the request is not consistent with the News Bureau programs, but serves some other worthwhile purpose, the costs should be paid from some account available to the requester. There is no blood left in the News Bureau's budgetary turnip. The rates for these requests will be the same as those charged to the News Bureau.

3 -- If any IUPUI student, faculty or staff member wants personal prints of photographs taken in the course of the News Bureau's activities, he may order them through the News Bureau or directly from the photographer. In either case, he will be billed directly by the photographer for these prints.

4 -- The photographer also is available for any personal photography assignments -- weddings, bar mitzvahs, mortgage burnings. Arrangements for these assignments should be negotiated directly with the photographer. The rates will probably be somewhat higher than those charged for News Bureau or other IUPUI assignments.

The basic rate for black and white photography is \$20 an hour of shooting time (no additional charge for darkroom work), \$2 for each proof sheet, and \$2 for finished glossy prints. There are additional charges for color photography and for unusually difficult or hazardous assignments.

The News Bureau would be delighted to provide any further details and to give any possible assistance.

The second performance, also at North Central, is Rossini's "Barber of Seville;" it will be given at 8 p.m. Wednesday, November 3 by the I.U. Opera Theater.
