New Face -- Dr. Robert J. Lewis has been appointed assistant dean and lecturer at the School of Business at IUPUI. He will be responsible for the daily administration of the school and will help administer its bachelor's, master's and doctoral degree programs. Before this appointment, he was assistant and acting chairman of the Division of General and Technical Studies at I.U.-Northwest.

Appointments -- The Department of Psychiatry announces the appointment of two new faculty members to child psychiatry. Dr. Howard W. Davis and Dr. Judith L. Campbell were named assistant professors. Dr. Davis is liaison psychiatrist with the Children's Services at Carter Hospital and participates in the teaching and clinical programs of the Riley Child Guidance Clinic. Dr. Campbell is assistant director of the clinic and director of psychiatric consultation and liaison services for Riley Hospital.

Transfer -- The I.U. trustees have transferred administrative control of the I.U.

Department of Anatomy and Physiology from the Bloomington campus to the Indianapolis campus. The change has the concurrence of Robert M. O'Neil, vice-president-Bloomington, and Dr. Glenn W. Irwin, Jr., vice-president-Indianapolis. The move is seen as one that will encourage close association of anatomists, physiologists and practicing physicians.

MEDICAL SCHOOL IN "AMBULATORY CARE" PROJECT

The I.U. School of Medicine has been selected as one of 10 institutions to participate in the Association of American Medical Colleges' project for the development of models for the provision of "One Class" ambulatory care services in university-affiliated teaching hospitals. The project is directed toward institutions in which the clinical faculty and administration of the college of medicine and the hospitals are committed to the provision of accessible, comprehensive, continuing one-class ambulatory medical services and to the improvement of physician education in the ambulatory setting.

Funded by a one-year contract from the Health Resources Administration of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, the project is designed to help plan and implement model hospital-based ambulatory care systems by means of workshops and onsite consultations.

DIRECTOR-HUNTING

The Consortium for Urban Education (CUE) of Indianapolis is accepting applications for a half-time director of community services.

The I.U. medical school recently was awarded \$3.03-million for five years to continue a Specialized Center of Research (SCOR) in Hypertension. This National Heart and Lung Institute-sponsored program began in 1971 in supporting five such centers for multidisciplinary research in hypertension.

Dr. James T. Higgins Jr., professor of medicine, directed the first Indiana SCOR project which involved investigators from the departments of medicine, medical genetics, physiology, pharmacology, pediatrics, biochemistry, obstetrics and gynecology, community health, sociology and the Lilly Laboratory for Clinical Research.

Dr. Myron H. Weinberger, associate professor of medicine, will direct the program for the second five-year period, which runs until November 30, 1980, and includes four such centers in the country. Dr. Weinberger noted that research will be conducted at both clinical and basic science levels and hopefully will bring new information on the causes and treatment for hypertension.
