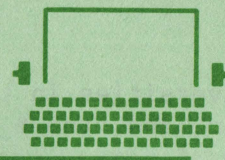


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LIBERAL ARTS, SCIENCE SCHOOLS SET CAREER DAYS

The School of Liberal Arts and the School of Science have both scheduled career days this fall so that students can talk with professional and successful persons in their fields and learn how they got that way.

How a liberal arts education relates to work experience will be at least one topic when the 1979 Career Fair gets under way Wednesday at 11 a.m. on the Cavanaugh Hall Mall. The fair is being sponsored by the Liberal Arts Alumni Association, the school, and the IUPUI Office of Career Counseling and Placement.

Jay Hackenbracht, a 1979 sociology graduate and coordinator of the fair, said he thinks it is important to acquaint more persons with the job-related advantages of studies in the humanities or social sciences. "In my own case," Hackenbracht said, "studying sociology has increased my understanding of how people work together and respond to each other. The discipline of completing requirements for sociology and other courses has taught me how to organize myself and my thinking." Hackenbracht is employed in quality control at an Indianapolis paper firm.

Guests have been invited from both public and private organizations. Specific fields include publications, advertising, mass media, public relations, retailing, personnel, banking, real estate, insurance and food service. Also included are federal and state government, health fields, marketing, management, public utilities, travel and manufacturing. Persons knowledgeable about requirements and educational opportunities in the schools of business, public and environmental affairs, law, social work and education will be on hand, along with experts from museums and the Indiana Committee for the Humanities.

More than 60 professionals, most of them graduates of schools at IUPUI, will be available for interviews and general discussion of their careers during the Careers Day of the Purdue School of Science on October 4 in the Krannert Science Building.

Career areas include the medical fields, banking and finance, advertising, weather forecasting, industrial and personnel relations, environmental areas, computer programming and analysts, museums, merchandising and marketing, manufacturing, mining and construction, law enforcement, health and social service agencies, technical writing and education. Tours of the Krannert Science Building laboratories and facilities will be conducted by the science students, and demonstrations and exhibits by the departments are planned during the two sessions.

Besides IUPUI students who wish to explore career areas, more than 740 high school science teachers have been invited to send their junior and senior students. Colleges

and universities in the area will also be attending the sessions from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. and from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m.
