
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IUPUI'S 16TH COMMENCEMENT WILL CONFER 3,668 IU/PURDUE DEGREES

ommencement 1985 will be Sunday, May 12, at 3 p.m. in the Hoosier Dome, where 3,668 students will receive degrees from IU or Purdue and where four honorary degrees will be conferred. Presiding will be Glenn W. Irwin, Jr., M.D., vice president (Indianapolis). President Steven C. Beering will confer Purdue degrees and President John W. Ryan will confer IU degrees. Seniors representing the two schools will be Michual W. Coe, IU, and Joseph F. Reinke, Purdue. IU induction ceremonies will be lead by Harry Gonso, vice president, IU Trustees, and Edgar F. Kettler, president, IU Alumni Association. Purdue induction ceremonies will be lead by John H. Karl Jr., associate director, Purdue Alumni Association.

Honorary degrees from IU will be bestowed on the following: Doctor of Laws, economist Clarence W. Efroymson, humanitarian and scholar who has been active in the social, intellectual and religious affairs in Indianapolis. Doctor of Humane Letters, philosopher Max H. Fisch, a revered authority in the field of American philosophical history. And, Doctor of Science, Harris B Shumacker Jr, medical scientist who has made pioneering contributions to cardiovascular and peripheral vascular surgery and the treatment of arterial disease. An honorary degree from Purdue University, Doctor of Engineering, will be bestowed on A. Donald Duke, leader and expert in the design of computerized systems and founder and president of the SEA Group, three leading corporations with headquarters in Carmel.

John A. Ruby will conduct the 74th U.S. Army Band and Rev. John J. Hogan, Chaplaincy Department, IU Hospitals, will lead the invocation.

Last week the 400 staff and faculty volunteers for the IUPUI Campus Campaign met in the Champions Room of the Sports Center and learned that preliminary results of their efforts look good. The Campus Campaign is the most extensive fund-raising effort ever on our campus. With all the results not in, gifts are up to \$383,719. The last of the three-phase campaign begins this week. The campus-based campaign began in February and the hospitals kicked off their campaign in mid-April. "Final results of this extraordinary effort on the part of our dedicated and hard-working volunteers will not be known until all the pledge cards are accounted for, probably early fall," said Neil E. Lantz, director of administrative affairs and co-chairman of the IUPUI Campaign. "I am extremely proud of the support shown by people from every area of campus. Many who gave were among those perhaps least able to afford it. They apparently want to be part of building IUPUI, and their gifts are going to help make the difference," he said.


GET IN THE 'CAR POOL' SWIM AT HERRON

If you sometimes feel you're living in your car, internationally known artist Bill Harding will take you one step further in his sculpture, "Car Pool," a station-wagon-turned-swimming pool. His entry and the work of other artists—60 paintings, drawings, prints, sculptures, videotapes, films, music and more—are part of the giant exhibition, "The Big Car Show: Contemporary Visions of the Automobile," on the grounds and in the gallery at Herron, May 11-June 22. The show covers the last 10 years of America's love affair with the automobile. It is a collection of cultural and artistic perspectives of the auto's image in society. Harding is the only artist asked by Herron to create a piece especially for the show. About his "Car Pool," Harding says it's an obvious pun, but explains that it's a signature piece that will mean different things to different people. "Once you have floated in or seen someone floating in a car, you never think of it in the same terms again...." -SAR
