POPULAR DEAN DIES

Dr. Dan B. Wolf, associate dean of the I.U. School of Liberal Arts at IUPUI and one of the best friends a student could have, died Wednesday, Aug. 14, at University Hospital. Services were held Sunday, Aug. 16, at the Indianapolis Hebrew Congregation.

Educated at Northwestern University, Memphis State University and I.U., Dr. Wolf joined the Indianapolis campus in 1965 to set up a student services organization and teach journalism. He was an associate professor of journalism.

Although active in many areas of academic affairs, his overriding concern was for the welfare of students. He created and financed the Dan Wolf Student Loan Fund, was faculty advisor to the Sagamore and chairman of the Student Publications Board. He was active on many IUPUI committees, including Student Services Advisory, Financial Aids, Student Affairs, Orientation and Academic Standards and Policies.

Dr. Wolf received two awards granted by student organizations — the William L. Garrett Student Service Award from the Black Student Union, and the Lola L. Lohse Faculty Appreciation Award for achievement in service and excellence in classroom teaching from the Student Assembly.

Memorial contributions may be made to the Dan Wolf Student Loan Fund at IUPUI, the American Cancer Society, the American Israel Cultural Foundation-NYC, the Hooverwood Guild, the Jewish Community Center Association and the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra.

IUPUI TO ASSIST DISABLED PERSONS

A commitment to disabled persons at IUPUI was made recently in a resolution from I.U.-Indianapolis Vice President Glenn W. Irwin, Jr., M.D., honoring the International Year of the Disabled Person as proclaimed by the United Nations.

The resolution commits IUPUI to provide convenient and effective access to higher education to all who can benefit. It calls attention to the fact that the components of the I.U. Medical Center have an ongoing commitment to patient care and research aimed at preventing and overcoming disabling conditions. IUPUI also will cooperate with other organizations and agencies so that "disabled persons can achieve fuller and better lives," Dr. Irwin said.

Several special projects and observances to celebrate the International Year of the Disabled Person are planned by the IUPUI Committee for the Handicapped, chaired by Professor Ronald Frank. Honorary chairman for disabled persons at IUPUI is handicapped student, George Holland.

JOURNALISM DEAN NAMED

Floyd G. Arpan, professor emeritus of journalism at Indiana University at Bloomington, has been named acting associate dean of journalism for the Indianapolis program of the I.U. School of Journalism. This starts the implementation of I.U.'s decision to establish a system-wide school of journalism.

A minor in journalism can be earned at IUPUI now. It is expected that by the time today's entering students reach their third and fourth years it will be possible to earn a bachelor's degree in journalism here.

Professor Arpan observed that Indianapolis offers an opportunity for specialized studies in such areas as legislative, business and medical science reporting. He said he will review current offerings at IUPUI to see that they correspond with similar journalism courses at Bloomington. He estimates that as many as 100 students may be enrolled at IUPUI who are interested in journalism studies. A laboratory with 20 typewriters has been established in Cavanaugh Hall.

CABLE BUILDING ADDED TO CAMPUS

Yet another, but not-so-new, building on the West Michigan Street campus of IUPUI will be put into full use this fall. University Theater, the Department of Speech and Theater, the journalism program offices, ROTC, the new Department of Military Science, and the IUPUI Child Care Center all have moved into the Mary E. Cable Building at 525 North Blackford Street, the northeast corner of Blackford and West Michigan streets on the east edge of the campus.

The 28-year-old former elementary school is named for its former principal, Mary E. Cable, an early black leader in education known for her success with black school children and student teachers during a 40-year career in Indianapolis. She was born in Kansas in 1862, worked in Indianapolis public schools until 1933, and died in 1944 at the age of 82.

IUPUI leases the Cable Building from the Indianapolis Public Schools, with option to buy. It has 20 classrooms that will be used mostly for teaching courses in speech, English composition and military science. There is also a large auditorium and stage on which the University Theater group will perform several plays each year. There is parking for the Cable Building to the south in Lot 94 on Michigan Street and just west of the building in Lot 72. Code letters for the building for campus mail are SI.

FINANCIAL SERVICES OFFERED

Added to the financial services offered to the faculty members, staff and students of IUPUI by the IUI Federal Credit Union and the bank machines of Indiana National Bank and Merchants Bank, is a new bank machine installed by the American Fletcher National Bank on the north outside wall of Cavanaugh Hall. AFNB also maintains a banking center in Room 111 of Cavanaugh, which offers general check and savings account services. The bank machine is available at all hours every day; the banking center is open Monday through Friday, 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.

The Credit Union maintains banking services in newly remodeled quarters opposite the medical bookstore on the main floor of the Union Building. Administrative offices and loan services still are in the University Services Building. INB bank machine is located in front of Regenstrief Health Center and Merchants is in the lobby of University Hospital.
