#### Report from the Chair

- January 19<sup>th</sup> meeting to coordinate recruiting activities for AY 06-07
  - See calendar of Enrollment Services activities on pp 9-15 below. Beginning at a meeting on January 19<sup>th</sup>, school-based activities will be added to this to create a comprehensive recruiting calendar. We hope to build on the earlier success of sharing communications initiatives and materials

One goal is to avoid conflicting events such as the time Engineering/Technology and Science hosted an event the weekend before a Scholars' Day function, potentially forcing some students into making a choice of which to attend. A second goal is to encourage collaboration between and among the schools and central offices and to avoid missed opportunities.

These efforts only work if the schools and central units continue to share their information and keep it current in common locations such as the Communications site and the Common Recruiting calendar <a href="http://registrar.iupui.edu/emc/communication/">http://registrar.iupui.edu/emc/communication/</a>

#### **Admissions and Enrollment Update**

- Notes from Mike Donahue
  - Spring
    - Freshmen---down 16% in beginners (-80 students)
    - Transfers----even (up 5 students)

#### Summer

- Freshmen---down 44% (-42 students)
- Transfers----up 27% (up 31 students)

#### Fall

- Freshmen----up 18% (up 323 students)
- Transfers-----up 23% (up 30 students)

- A new undergraduate admissions report is available for IUPUI schools on the point-in-cycle website. The current admissions report typically shows close to 100% of applicants admitted for schools other than University College, especially for weeks close to census. This occurs because many applicants not admitted directly to the school are entered with University College as their school. The new report is based on which school the intended major is housed. The report shows the number of applicants, the number admitted directly to the school, and the number admitted to University College. - Fall Susan Sutton reported that at this early point the campus is up 138% in undergraduate applications and 40% in graduate applications. Though a significant part of this may be attributed to the Saudi scholarships (see <a href="http://registrar.iupui.edu/emc/emc-meetings/min-1118.pdf">http://registrar.iupui.edu/emc/emc-meetings/min-1118.pdf</a>), if the numbers continue to be as strong as they are now, more study will be needed to help understand the balance of the surge in applications.
- Spring Enrollment attached below pp 7-8
  - Following census, Enrollment Services and the full EMC will review Spring enrollments and seek any lessons learned from enrollment promotion efforts. These include school-based contacts of their majors to encourage their registration as well as Financial Aid contacting First Time/Full Time students to help them address any financial barrier to spring enrollment, among others.
  - O Becky noted that shifts in enrollment by the graduate non-degree population masked a growing drop in enrollment in University College. This has implications for schools offering service courses and for the pipeline of future majors for the schools. See note at end of the detailed enrollment report attached below.
  - A continuing concern is the number of contacts that the university has to contact students to encourage them to complete even the simplest of tasks, such as complying with the meningitis disclosure. We need to find ways to prompt action without having to contact the same students repeatedly.
  - Given that Spring of 2005 was somewhat of an anomaly following the difficult start in the new SIS in Fall term of 2004, we need to look at enrollments over a longer perspective. Mary Beth Myers will prepare a five year enrollment trend to share with EMC.
  - Mary Beth Myers will review Spring enrollment data to see if the anecdotal reports of an increased number of returning students at the November EMC meeting were true. Mark reminded the group of the stop-out project from 2004 where students who were out of any IU campus for at least two years and who lived in central Indiana were contacted and encouraged to enroll. The results showed no improvement over the usual stop-out return rates.

#### **Council on Retention and Graduation**

• Scott was not present. Becky noted that the council steering group has a meeting coming up and that the Council on Retention and Graduation and the Enrollment Management Council may hold a joint meeting in March as part of an Enrollment Management presentation (see below)

### **Enrollment Forecasting and Capacity Analysis**

- Report from Kathy Burton
  - Kathy distributed a sample set of materials to help a department or school with its projections (see attachment below). This includes data on its majors for the past ten years as well as similar information for potential majors in UCOL. It also includes details on the mix of students in a program or school, such as enrollment by class standing, resident/non resident, international, and by ethnic group. Respondents will be given the opportunity to select a preferred enrollment mix by 2010, for example.
  - Members reviewed the form and made a number of suggestions
    - Adding percentage distributions to certain data elements, such as those comprising a mix of students.

- Adding a field where respondents can note any assumptions or contingencies, such as the ability of another school or department to offer enough required courses, such as Biology for health-related majors. This would also include any capacity issues.
- Training dates tentatively scheduled for 10:00 a.m. on February 15<sup>th</sup> and 17<sup>th</sup>. While the primary audience is those individuals in the schools with the responsibility for preparing the enrollment projections, members of the Steering Group are encouraged to attend and share their impressions of the training and the task.
- We want to be careful not to overwhelm the schools with the project. This is in part an educational process and as we anticipate this will be an annual activity it must be clear that this is our initial effort and that we will continue to refine and improve it.
- Members with any other ideas on modifying the materials should send them to Kathy as soon as possible.

#### **Enrollment Management Presentation at March Meeting**

- Don Hossler of IUB will present
  - The group agreed to invite members of the Retention and Graduation Council, chairs of other Enrollment Management-related groups, and leadership of Faculty Council to Don's presentation.
  - Becky suggested that we consider scheduling a meeting with chairs of all Enrollment
    Management related groups in April or May to review the work of each and identify areas of
    collaboration, duplication, or missed opportunities as well as discuss issues raised in the
    Hossler presentation
  - Members had some suggestions for issues or questions they would like Don to address.
    - The interconnectedness of enrollments between and among the schools
    - How does IUB communicate among the schools, including changes in programs and their potential impact?
    - How to establish recruiting targets for different ability levels of students that improve quality while still providing access
    - How to improve the quality of admitted students without jeopardizing enrollments
    - How to be more aggressive in recruiting for our campus needs
    - How to recruit differently for different groups of student such as 21<sup>st</sup> Century Scholars and students attending higher performing high schools
    - o In light of Chancellor Bantz's goals of establishing IUPUI as a national urban destination for students in health and science, how do we recruit nationally?
    - How to spend limited recruiting resources, including admissions and campus-based aid in meeting enrollment targets and other pricing strategies
    - Coordination in recruitment and retention in enrollment management

Members agreed that this presentation should then lead to continued discussions by a number of groups, including the deans. We should use this opportunity to help articulate the questions and focused topics for such discussions which may, in turn, help direct the work of the EMC<sup>2</sup> in the future. Trudy offered to help with this effort.

#### Status of Search for Director of IMIR

 Trudy reported that the top three candidates will return to campus in mid-February for another round of interviews.

#### Throughout year

Reports of AIP activities from schools and units. Becky noted that Enrollment Services intends to use AIP to review the processes for inter-campus transfers, returning students, and traditional transfers to make sure their enrollment is as smooth as possible.

#### Future Topics for the Steering Group (and possible items to schedule for full council)

- Selections of future "data nuggets" for presentation to the full council. In addition to any data or information sources that support the presentations on central initiatives noted above, Victor has suggested the following as possibilities:
  - o Geographic origin of students
  - Student choice of college
  - o Correlates of yield (percent of admits who enroll)
  - Major migration
- Marketing/communications and determining what is seen as most effective in terms of maintaining or building enrollment. This is of special interest to the deans as some of the recommended steps require a significant commitment of time by school personnel
- Additional review on the special challenges of intercampus transfer students who, according to IMIR's recent study, bring lower grades and are less-well prepared to succeed than many external transfers
- Review additional data tools such as <a href="www.savi.org">www.savi.org</a> and GIS to provide schools with census, employment, housing, and education data that may be use in recruiting new students and in thinking about enrollment in more sophisticated ways.
  - We might be able to work with faculty in some of their courses or with graduate students
- From Dean Plater's charge at the October 2005 meeting
  - Improving Retention and Graduation, including among senior level students and courses
  - o Mission Differentiation and establishment of campus-specific Admissions standards

    - Finding the right mix of students given fewer beginners and more transfers
  - Support for Adult students
