Match Day is next Friday

Excitement is building for Match Day 2017. On Friday, March 17, fourth-year IU School of Medicine students will join their peers from across the nation to learn where they will complete their medical residencies. The simultaneous nationwide opening of the envelopes with details from the National Resident Matching Program (NRMP) will take place at precisely noon EST.

Match Day festivities will be held in the Van Nuys Medical Science Atrium on the IU School of Medicine-Indianapolis campus. Limited seating is available, with students and families receiving preference on the first floor of the atrium. IU School of Medicine faculty and staff are encouraged to support the students from the second and fourth floor balconies.

IU School of Medicine will promote Match Day via its social media channels, and the NRMP is asking participants to use the hashtag #Match2017 in social media posts. For the event timeline and information on visitor parking, visit Medical Student Education.

IU School of Medicine ID cards valid until June 2018

Although Indiana University is rolling out the new CrimsonCard this spring, IU School of Medicine ID cards will remain valid and continue to work until at least June 30, 2018.

Current IU School of Medicine students, faculty and staff, including part-time and student workers, should disregard *the timing* indicated in the IU-wide promotion and

wait until early August 2017, to secure a replacement card.

Reminders and updates will be shared throughout the summer in INScope and via MedTV.

What about newly hired IU School of Medicine faculty and staff and new students?

CrimsonCards will be issued beginning the week of Monday, March 13. (Please call the card services office at 317-274-5177 before arrival to confirm availability.)

What about newly hired IU School of Medicine faculty and staff and new students in Indianapolis who need IU Health facility access?

Those hired now through May who require IU Health facility access in Indianapolis will be given a companion card. Since all cards issued after May will offer single card access, those issued this companion card will need to get a replacement.

OPTIMISTIC reduces unnecessary hospital stays for nursing home residents

Indiana University's OPTIMISTIC initiative is improving care and cutting costs by reducing unnecessary hospital stays for long-term nursing home residents. According to a new study published in Health Affairs, the OPTIMISTIC care model reduced potentially avoidable hospitalizations of long-stay nursing home residents by nearly 40 percent and total hospitalizations by 25 percent.

"Unnecessary hospital transfers are poor quality care," said OPTIMISTIC director Kathleen T. Unroe, MD, MHA, IU Center for Aging Research scientist, IU School of Medicine assistant professor, and Regenstrief Institute investigator. "OPTIMISTIC is about systems change, about supporting nursing homes to provide excellent care, care that matches what patients and their families want."

As policies are approved, they are tagged and indexed in preparation for housing on MedNet. Ultimately, all policies will be available within a single verified official portal on MedNet, which will be linked from the student handbook and other online locations.

Indiana CTSI accepting applications for CTR pilot grants

The Indiana Clinical and Translational Sciences Institute (CTSI) is accepting applications for its Collaboration in Translational Research (CTR) pilot program. The program's objective is to encourage collaborations across CTSI partner institutions and initiate or continue translational research projects that have strong and immediate potential to develop into larger, externally funded research programs or generate novel intellectual property.

Applications will be evaluated on the quality of the proposed science, as well as each application's strength in clarifying the plan for leveraging the award toward the achievement of CTR objectives. Funding for projects is limited to \$75,000, and the duration is up to two years. Proposed projects should have at least two principal investigators/collaborators with equal contribution, from at least two of the five sponsoring affiliates for this program: IU School of Medicine, IUPUI (non-IU School of Medicine), IU Bloomington, Purdue University (West Lafayette) and the University of Notre Dame.

Application details are available. Letters of intent are due Monday, April 3, and the application deadline is Friday, May 5.


