Board Meeting: The National FFA Board of Directors and National Foundation Board of Trustees met in Indianapolis, Ind., July 11-15, 2003. Read the attached summary for more information on the meeting.

Students participate in service learning event: "How Many Pounds of Sweet Potatoes Can WLC Students Glean?" This question was posed to 239 Washington Leadership Conference (WLC) participants the first week of the National FFA Organization's summer conference. The answer...40,000 pounds...in forty-five minutes! What would have taken regular volunteers two days to glean for homeless and the underprivileged, took WLC's first week of participants less than one hour. For the first time ever, WLC incorporated a service learning event into the weekly conference. By partnering with the Mid-Atlantic Gleaning Network, each Saturday WLC students gleaned fruits and vegetables to be distributed to homeless in the Washington, D.C., and Baltimore, Maryland metro areas. Whether it's sorting through produce already picked from the fields or rolling up their sleeves and walking through strawberry patches, the WLC students experienced a true taste of servant leadership. Members called the service learning the highlight of their

NATIONAL FFA CONVENTION NEWS

Reminder: Convention registration fee set at \$30 and \$35 beginning in 2003: The National FFA Board of Directors and National FFA Officers have set the national FFA convention attendance fee at \$30 for pre-registration and \$35 for on-site registration beginning in 2003. The action was taken to offset significant increases in costs for services, decoration, staging, labor and security. As a break-even activity, convention costs are borne by participants and not by general dues. Even with the approved increase, the \$30/\$35 FFA convention fee remains markedly lower than national meeting fees for other student organizations: VICA/Skills USA - \$90/\$100; FCCLA - \$100/\$110; and FBLA - \$85/95.

Delegate schedule for 2003 National FFA Convention: With the National FFA delegate process starting at 10 a.m. on Tuesday (registration that morning from 7-10 a.m.), there are no official delegate activities on Monday at the 2003 National FFA Convention. Instead, a past national FFA officer will be contracted to host activities for state FFA officers and other youth leaders (those serving as delegates). These activities will be completely optional; they will not be coordinated or sponsored by National FFA staff, and will be offered on a fee basis. The past national officer will be selected in the coming month and will send a survey to state leaders to identify two or three activity options on that Monday. These options might include tours, workshops, meal functions, etc. Once arrangements are made, an order form will be sent to state leaders to sign up and pay for the activities in which they choose to have students participate. PALS Mentoring Conference at the 2003 National Convention: The format for the PALS Mentoring Conference at the national FFA convention has been changed for 2003. We regret that we will not have the elementary students from the Louisville area this year; however, this year's conference will focus more on instruction in why and how to conduct PALS programs at the chapter level.

The conference will be broken into two sessions. One session will focus on chapters that

have established a PALS program at their schools. This session will feature guest speaker Mark Reardon with contributions from several others. The focus of this session will be to energize students about the importance of mentoring to youth and how to impact positive change on the lives of their mentees as well as their community as a whole. The second session will focus on chapters interested in starting a PALS program and looking for ideas to get established. This session will feature brief presentations from advisors and members of FFA chapters that have some of the nation's most well established PALS programs. After the presentations there will be roundtable discussions where members and advisors from schools share ideas and ask questions about the PALS mentoring program.

We hope that all participants will leave energized, more informed, and with a plan in hand to revamp or start an effective PALS program. Each participating chapter will receive a free CD-ROM that contains new instructional materials and resources to operate an effective PALS program. Time Capsule Mission for FFA Associations: Twenty-five years from now, what will FFA members and advisors want to know about FFA in 2003? As state staff and state

officers, the National FFA Organization asks you to lead the charge in collecting items and information for inclusion in the state box you contribute to the FFA 100th Anniversary Time Capsule, which will be filled at the 2003 National FFA Convention. Consider items that represent your state, its agricultural base and the status of agricultural education. Pictures, letters, magazine clippings, scrapbooks are just some of the items that could be included. Reflect on the past 25 years from 1977 through 2003. Summarize the present attitudes and atmosphere regarding agricultural education, agriculture and FFA. Envision the future. Set forth predictions. In his letter, the 1977-78 national FFA western region vice president predicted convention attendance at the 75th National FFA Convention would reach 50,000 people. Final attendance numbers were 51,025.

Be creative. While financial reports, meeting minutes and leadership conference curriculum may give future members an idea of FFA in 2003, consider what it feels, looks, tastes and smells like. Capture FFA in ways from which future generations can learn. Specifics

- State boxes must be the size of a shirt box or a UPS shipping box (2nd Day Air).
 Dimensions are approximate. Try not to exceed the following: 17" x 12.5" x 3.5".
- Boxes cannot contain perishable items. The time capsule will be placed in storage and not opened for a pre-determined time - 25 years maximum.
- The National FFA Organization cannot guarantee the safe return of items included in state boxes. You are encouraged to make copies or keep an itemized list of the materials included in your box.
- An itemized list of materials included in your box must be submitted to National FFA before being placed in the time capsule.

National FFA Awards and CDE Advisory Board Award Revision Process: Every five years, the National FFA Organization's CDEs, award and recognition programs are reviewed to keep them closely aligned with instructional relevance, current technology, industry practices and the mission, vision and strategic direction of Agricultural Education and FFA. This year, we are beginning another round of this ongoing review process.

Currently, three subcommittees are evaluating award and recognition programs. As the committees continue their review process, the National FFA Organization will keep you up-to-date with the progress and status of the committees and the project timeframe, which is expected to last through 2005. Electronic SPAM rears its ugly head. We've mentioned false e-mails in the past, but it appears to be time for a reminder. Recently, State Staff representatives whose e-mail

addresses are included in an FFA group list have received annoying e-mail messages that appear to originate from FFA. These e-mails are unsolicited, sometimes less-than-ethical electronic garbage, or SPAM. Unfortunately, the existence of search tools that deliberately harvest e-mail addresses from websites makes it far too easy for unscrupulous people to send thousands of unwanted e-mails and substitute legitimate addresses in the "Sender" line.

The National FFA Organization remains committed to protecting the security and privacy of its e-mails as much as possible, but cannot prevent every instance of e-mail harvesting due to the number of places (websites, ListServ) that e-mails may be legitimately available. As you may be aware, anti-spam legislation has been proposed more than once in Congress, but is proving difficult to define and make possible. Feel free to follow this debate as it continues. In addition, attached to this message you'll find a .PDF that explains just how easy it is to harvest and misuse these e-mails.

- Approval of the VIP award for Walter E. Upton, Little Rock, Ark.; Joseph Sabol, San Luis Obispo, Calif.; James C. Borel, Wilmington, Del.; John P. Mundt, Boise, Idaho; Martin L. Mitchell, Dover, N.H.; John W. Parris, Columbia, S.C.; John W. Rose, Hickman, Tenn.; John D. Todd, Knoxville, Tenn.; Jane Bagley, Dimmit, Texas; Clarence Pearson, Oakville, Wash.; and Benny Renick, South Charleston, W.V.
- The recommendation of developing a National FFA Volunteer Summit at the national FFA convention. (Approved by the National FFA Foundation Board of Trustees)
- The recommendation of developing a volunteer award to recognize individuals who promote and practice volunteerism. (Approved by the National FFA Foundation Board of Trustees)
- The recommendation of developing a pilot program in capacity building through volunteer recruitment and individual giving. (Approved by the National FFA Foundation Board of Trustees)

- The recommendation to seek \$1,000,000 to \$1,250,000 in special project funding from the FFA Foundation for the development of authentic assessment strategies as part of Vision 2020. (Approved by the National FFA Foundation Board of Trustees)
- The recommendation to appoint Gordon Galbraith (Oregon) as an adult consultant of the National FFA Officer Selection Process.
- The recommendation to seek approximately \$1,000,000 in special project funding from the FFA Foundation for the development of global agricultural education resources. (Approved by the National FFA Foundation Board of Trustees)
- The recommendation to approve in concept the "Grow Our Own" Diversity Initiative and to seek approximately \$1,000,000 in special project funding from the FFA Foundation and refer the item to the National FFA Board of Directors Governing Committee, in consultation with Ms. Elaine Lewis as chairperson of the Organization Diversity Thrust Committee for action at a future date. (Approved by the National FFA Foundation Board of Trustees, pending approval by the National FFA Board Governing Committee)
- Adopt the following policy regarding chartering FFA Chapters in non-public schools.
 "State FFA Associations may charter local FFA Chapters in non-public schools as long as the National FFA Organizational guidelines are met" (Guidelines will be included in the Policy and Procedure Handbook. To obtain the full legal opinion, contact the National FFA Advisor.)
- Have legal counsel review all applicable documents regarding religious expression and develop a recommended policy and guidelines for the January 2004 National FFA Board meeting.
- Submit to the delegates for consideration at the 2003 National FFA Convention that 2004-2005 dues be \$5 per member per year.
- Appoint Steve Zimmerman as board representative to the National FFA Officer Selection Process
- Motion to refer the selection of the new Agri-Science Superintendent was postponed. Moved to refer the motion to the National FFA Governing Committee.

Motions failed to carry:

• The motion "to continue The Council's "Professional Growth Series (PGS)" of instructional material under the "Team Ag Ed" label managed by the National FFA Organization's Educational Division and to secure, when available, appropriate corporate support as special projects of the National FFA Foundation" (Note: The board determined that the National FFA should continue to focus on its primary mission of "premier leadership, personal growth, and career success" and not become more involved in

technical agricultural curriculum development. For this reason, the board rejected the National Council's Professional Growth Series (PGS) proposal.)

The next meeting of the National FFA Board of Directors will be Monday, Oct. 27, 2003, in Louisville, Ky. The next meeting of the Foundation Executive Committee will be on October 29, 2003, in Louisville, Ky.

The January 2004 National Board of Directors' meeting will be held January 22-26, 2004, at Hilton Old Town in Alexandria, Va.

National FFA Foundation Board of Trustees Meeting Summary July 15, 2003

The board meeting took place at the Adam's Mark Hotel in Indianapolis.

Reports

• Sponsors' Board Chairman Jerry Brase indicated that the fundraising effort is \$130,000 ahead of pace set last year. The goal this year is \$9 million. He attributed the success this far to 38 caring individuals of the Sponsors' Board who have been outstanding fundraisers. He also noted the significance of the individual giving potential.

Board actions:

- The board approved special project funding for Vision 2020: Building A Seamless Educational System for the Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources Industry, presented by the National Council for Agricultural Education President, Ted Mottaz. (Draft budget for Vision 2020 Initiative is \$1,128,600.)
- The board approved the preliminary FFA Foundation budget for calendar year 2004.

Taking Convention Home

- Harness your students' enthusiasm by developing activities surrounding your personal convention schedule.
- Work with fellow faculty to design inter-disciplinary assignments that would substitute for work missed while at convention.
 - Write an essay for English class about the convention trip.
 - Develop an expense report for an accounting class.
 - Prepare a presentation about agriculture and science using information gathered at the career show and agriscience fair for a science class.
- Have agribusiness students track their expenses while at convention. At home, using his/her receipts, each student can develop an expense report for him/herself or for the chapter.
- Collect ideas for chapter activities from FFA members from different states.
- Look ahead in your lesson plans and have students find information to supplement your teaching.
- Convention is a great place for hunting: scavenger hunts, photo hunts, signature hunts.
 - Scavenger Hunt: The career show is a perfect place to find pencils, buttons, games and people.
 - Photo Hunt: Using disposable cameras, take pictures of convention speakers, the career show, a leadership workshop, Louisville attractions, etc.
 - Signature Hunt: Use the back pages of the convention guidebook to gather signatures from students from other states OR have each student bring a T-shirt for an autograph collection as a post-convention memento.

At the Career Show

- Find three exhibits that relate to a career chosen by the student.

 Gather information, interview the exhibitors and then share the experience with students at home.
- Collect business cards and handouts. Back in the classroom, make a display for each career field.
- Gather information about various colleges and present the information to the senior class.
- Require each student to visit 15 company booths and make a list of three occupations related to each company. In an exhibit hall of more than 350 exhibitors, this task shouldn't be too hard.

It's very very easy to extract a list of email addresses from a web site.... With the free tool demoed below I extracted hundreds upon hundreds of emails from www.ffa.org in a matter of seconds.



Imagine the wealth of emails there are just on our website... both of our internal addresses, and worse yet, our members.... People need to understand that if you post your email everywhere you're going to get spam.


It's just like publishing your phone number in the phone book. If you put your number in there; sure your great grandma Betty can look you up, call and give you her cookie recipe, but telemarketers are also going to call and try and sell you new vinyl siding. If you don't want the calls don't post your number.



People don't understand that everywhere they or someone posts info about someone on a website, chat board, news group, etc that it's a potential target for spammers to collect and use.

For example here below I searched the web for an email address with some common search engines... This is a person that thought they hadn't put their email address anywhere but with us.... Apparently they are wrong, whether they realize it or not, I found it at two other totally independent farm related sites.

We have absolutely no way to stop spammers of collecting an address on another site and spamming a person. That would be similar to me walking into the post office and saying "give me all the mail that Billy down the street sent Tommy on the other side of town, because Billy wants me to stop all Tommy's mail."

Worst off, faking the origin of mail is extremely simple. Observe below as I send a mail to myself faking the sender field to seem as though it came from someone at the FBI. Because of the way email is designed and likened after real mail its simple to pretend to be someone you're not.

How hard would it be to write up a nasty letter to the president of some major company, slap a stamp on it and then write some random return to address on the envelope and drop it in the mail? Would the FBI go arrest the person that's listed as the return address on the envelope because that's the envelope that the threatening letter came in? Probably not.

It's the same situation with email. Just because email appears to come from someone, it doesn't mean it did. There are of course checks in place on some mail servers that limit this trickery, but sadly there are just as many email servers out there that allow this aggregation to continue.
