

TUPUI, CITY SADDENED BY LOSS OF COMMUNITY LEADERS

Along with the entire Indianapolis community, all of us at IUPUI were shocked and saddened by the deaths of such good friends in a midair collision of two planes Sept. 11. Our departed friends are Michael Carroll, vice president for community development at the Lilly Endowment, Inc.; Frank McKinney Jr., Chairman of Banc One, Indiana Corp.; Robert V. Welch, owner of R.V. Welch Investments, Inc. and head of the White River Park Development Commission; and John Weliever, former director of the Hoosier Lottery. In addition, the two pilots, William Bennett Jr. and William Mullen, were taken in this tragedy.

The loss of these four close friends and civic leaders is one of the most profound tragedies in our city's history and in the history of IUPUI. They all served the city and state with great dedication and their efforts contributed in very important ways improve the quality of life for all of us. Each was blessed with vision and the capacity to serve in a variety of roles to contribute to the lives of those around them.

IUPUI will especially miss the leadership of Mike Carroll, who was one of IUPUI's greatest champions. Mike was not only a dear friend but one of our city's strongest leaders. He worked tirelessly for our urban community and for IUPUI. He played a key role in many significant developments, including the recent creation of our Center for Urban Policy and the Environment and the addition of excellent athletic and fitness facilities. Perhaps most of all we'll miss his dynamic leadership in our intercollegiate athletics programs, including his perennial presidency of the Metro Athletic Club.

Our city will never be the same, or as full of life and energy, without Mike Carroll. He was the personification of the Hoosier spirit of volunteerism, civic pride and love of family and community. No one who knew him could fail to respect him and cherish the way he raised the quality of life and spirit of this part of the world.

CAMPUS UNITED WAY GOAL INCREASED FOR 1992 CAMPATON



ampus United Way solicitors have set a goal of \$300,000 for the 1992 campaign, a 9-percent increase over last year's goal. Last year's effort raised \$285,000, \$10,000 over the goal of \$275,000. Organizers at TUPUI also hope to increase participation in the program from 35 to 45 percent before the campaign closes Oct. 31. United Way supports 76 local agencies throughout Marion County and surrounding counties.

BUSINESS SCHOOL ENROLLS FIRST MBA CLASS

The I.U. Graduate School of Business has its new MBA program up and running, with the first class of students enrolled and using a new system which integrates course work with team decision making. The MBA program will bring in 60 new students each semester and each group will remain together during the 32-month program. This year's class averages six years of work experience and will continue full-time work careers while pursuing graduate studies. The average age is 29, most live within a 60-mile radius of the campus, women make up 33 percent of the group and almost half come from a science or engineering academic background.


SCHOOL OF NURSING EARNS 1992 EXCELLENCE AWARD


