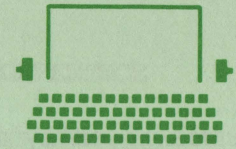

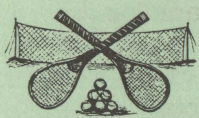

RHYTHMS OF THE HEART TO HONOR DR. CHARLES FISCH

To honor the lifetime he has spent on matters of the heart, from around the world colleagues of Charles Fisch, M.D., creative force of the Krannert Institute of Cardiology at the Medical Center, will meet to note his immeasurable contributions to the study and treatment of heart disorders, particularly arrhythmias. Coming together for the conference, "Rhythms of the Heart: Art and Science" on campus Nov. 8-9 will be pioneering researchers and "clever" cardiologists. The "hearty" group includes Frits L. Meijler, M.D., from the Interuniversity Cardiology Institute of the Netherlands, whose quest is to gather EKGs of the mammal hearts--from mouse to elephant and more currently the whale. From Denver will be Robert S. Eliot, M.D., who will give the dinner address and discuss his work as an interpreter of the effects of the heartfelt disturbances that men and women feel from the daily angst they experience. Beyond angst is "Chaos," and the author of the book so named, Jose Jalife, M.D., from the State University of New York Health Center, will talk about his work. Sudden death among seemingly healthy young people is the intrigue of Thomas N. James, M.D., from the University of Texas Medical Branch, who will talk on the subject. Also joining in the celebration for Dr. Fisch is Francois Abboud, M.D., president of the American Heart Association, whose concern these days is funding heart research and finding out more about heart disease in women. Also on board will be William L. Winters, Jr., M.D., the president of the American College of Cardiology, who will be in the company of seven past presidents of the College, who are all faculty at the Krannert Institute--including Dr. Fisch himself, twice past-president. LEONARD TO LEAD NEW HONORSCHOLAR PROGRAM

Jennifer Pease Leonard of Bloomington has been named acting director of the new IUPUI HonorScholar Program, an initiative designed to encourage scholars who expect to enter a professional school after they complete an undergraduate degree at IUPUI. Leonard said the program is still in the planning stages and that she expects to enroll students in the first class in the fall of 1992. The enriched preprofessional program will be offered through the Schools of Science and Liberal Arts, with full cooperation and support from IUPUI's three professional schools--law, dentistry and medicine. The five schools will provide faculty and student mentors, as well as academic support and other information about the professions. The goal is to orient academically outstanding undergraduates to the professions early in their university experience and to encourage postgraduate education. Another "only at IUPUI" initiative, this joint venture will offer selected undergraduates enriched and intensive opportunities to advance toward careers as future physicians, dentists and lawyers. A limited number of HonorScholar students will be accepted and, they will have to meet and maintain stringent academic and personal requirements, including scholastic achievement, ethical standards, civic motivation and good leadership qualities. They will study full-time in the Science or Liberal Arts. Highly interactive and continuous counseling of the students will provide reasonable assurance of their eventual admission into the pre-reserved slots of the professional schools. The program also seeks to attract exceptional high school students and to maximize the quality of the applicant pool for the professional schools. Herself a scholar, Leonard graduated with distinction from SPEA at Bloomington and is completing a master's degree in journalism, also at IUB, where she was assistant director of admissions. "Jennifer Leonard comes to us with superb qualifications to give substance to the vision of the HonorScholar program," said Erwin Boschmann, associate dean of faculties (AO 139), whose office oversees the program. She is married to Michael Leonard, a columnist for the Herald-Times at Bloomington, and is the daughter of retired Franklin dentist Edward and Mrs. Patricia Pease.

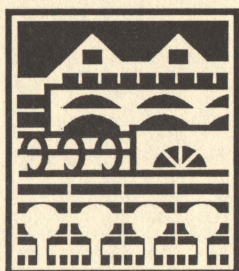
